





HIGHER EDUCATION DIVISION

PAINTING AND TOURING TRIP TO THE AMALFI COAST OF ITALY: MAY 9-17, 2008

Just 82 steep steps down from our balcony was the rocky coast of the Bay of Naples which became our outdoor studio on several days when the eight of us, artist friends, were not walking the path to the nearby fishing village to find inspiration at the Marina della Lobra. Our stay was productive and fun. When we weren't creating works of art, we were allowed a little time for visiting other ports and even a museum or two.

The National Archeological Museum is located in Naples and on the afternoon of our arrival, my friend, Ann Reynolds, and I caught the bus to this museum to see its artifacts. After climbing two flights of stairs, we entered galleries containing frescos from Pompeii, vases from Paestum and bronze statues from Herculaneum. The 2nd level hosted mosaics from Pompeii, and the "secret room" (here were images on the xrated side). One of the most important objects taken from Pompeii, although damaged when doing so, is the mosaic "Battle of Alexander". It is a great example of artistry in proportion and perspective and 2nd century copy of a Greek original. On the ground floor, and before heading back to

the bus that would take us on to the Villa at Massa Lubrense, was the Farnese collection of marble statues that were of Greek and Roman origin.

From our villa we could walk up the hill for the bus to Sorrento, and on one morning we rode the winding cliff road to Amalfi to see and sketch its streets and coastline. There was the Amalfi Cathedral in the main square with its Romanesque mixture of Moorish and Byzantine style architecture and 1,000 year old bronze door brought from Constantinople. The visit inside included four stops: Cloister of Paradise, Basilica of the Crucifix, which is now a museum of art treasures including a beautiful small "Madonna and child" by a follower of Giotto, the Crypt of St Andrew, and the large and impressive Cathedral. After lunch of pasta, gelato and cappuccino, we took a scenic boat ride back to our port.

I return refreshed from southern Italy, having had the pleasure of spending time with seven special artist friends, eating and painting together. I created 16 watercolors and small acrylic canvases of scenes painted from our Massa Lurense villa.

Hopefully, many of you have had the opportunity to renew your artistic spirits through travel and artistic adventures this summer. I

hope you feel refreshed as you start planning for the upcoming academic year.

I think that we all recognize that the economic climate is not the same as last year, and with economic pressures all around us, it is even more important that we stand together and support art education. It is with that concern, that I thank you for all that you continue to do in your profession and for your assistance to your state's professional organization. I hope that our division can continue to provide support to art educators in the state and I look forward to seeing you at the 2008 FAEA Conference, October 16-19, in Orlando.

Let me also extend a special thank you now to those of you who will be presenters and workshop instructors at the state conference. Thank you for making that commitment. Others will benefit because of your willingness to do so!

Also, this is an invitation to those who will be attending the conference to come to the Higher Education Division meeting which is an important sharing time. There will be food for thought and body, and time to share your concerns. I look forward to seeing you there.

Provocative Pairings

Drawn from the Museum's permanent collection, pairings in this exhibition place art produced in different time periods, in different media and from different points of view, side by side. The exhibition will stimulate new thinking and may transform your point of view.

CORNELL MUSEUM OF FINE ARTS AT ROLLINS COLLEGE WWW.ROLLINS.EDU/CFAM MAY 20, 2008 - JANUARY 4, 2009

Small Paintings from the Permanent Collection

This exhibition offers a rich visual introduction into the land-scape and the genre scene. Approximately two dozen 19th and 20th century small-scale European and American paintings including the works of Albert Bierstadt, Thomas Moran, Franz de Paula Ferg, Pieter Cornelisz van Slingelandt, and Charles Brias chosen from the permanent collection will be on view in the Yust Gallery.

THE CHARLES HOSMER MORSE MUSEUM OF AMERICAN ART WWW.MORSEMUSEUM.ORG ONGOING

Art Jewelry, Favrile Metalwork and Precious Glass by Louis Comfort Tiffany

Unlike the extravagant jewelry produced under the direction of Charles Lewis Tiffany (1812-1902) at Tiffany & Co., the son's jewelry was distinguished by design and color. He executed his innovative creations using largely semiprecious stones and enamels.

Selected Works of Louis Comfort Tiffany from the Morse Collection The first three galleries at the Morse have been installed with more than 100 objects that represent what an art critic in 1900 noted as Tiffany's "dumbfounding versatility." These works include 14 leaded-glass windows as well as examples of lamps, art glass, ceramics, and metalwork.

ONGOING

Secrets of Tiffany Glassmaking

Through photographs, models, tools and art objects, this teaching exhibit shows the range of Louis C. Tiffany's glass production, from mosaics and molded-glass jewels to leaded-glass windows and lamps, providing insights into the techniques employed by his artisans.

From Swords to Plowshares: Trench Art from World War II
This special exhibition features art pieces made by soldiers in the field during World War II. Itinerant artists made art with artillery shells, bullets, shrapnel, aircraft parts, currency, and other miscellaneous metal scrap and applied materials. The ingenuity and skill ranged from primitive artillery shell vases to elaborate lamps, cigarette lighters and ashtrays exhibiting high artistic craftsmanship.



CALL FOR ARTIST TRADING CARDS

Artist Trading Cards (ATC's) will once again be a part of the FAEA Conference student art display in Orlando, October 16-19, 2008. Each teacher who attends conference may bring a deck of cards plus two for a total of 54 cards. This means you can bring 52 hand crafted mini 2.5" x 3.5" works of art that your students have created using any medium. The front of the card has the student design and the back of the card should have the name of the student artist, school, and county as well as any advocacy statement the student wants to express. The cards will need to fit into a plastic card sleeve (the plastic display sleeves for the cards will be provided to you). The two extra cards should have the following information: name of the school, county and art teacher.

Making ATC's with your students is a

great way to start the school year. Have them illustrate a special summer event, collage with items from their vacation or illustrate an art vocabulary word. Anything goes and the more they make, the better they get!

DR. DEBORAH B. REEVE

Dr. Deborah B. Reeve is the Executive Director of the National Art Education Association (NAEA), located in Reston, Virginia. NAEA is the only national education association dedicated exclusively to supporting those professionals who are engaged in teaching, leading and learning in the visual arts. The Association's 22,000 member art educators represent preK-12 teachers, college and university professors and researchers, school/district and fine art museum administrators and collegiate students preparing to become art educators throughout the United States, Canada and overseas. Dr. Reeve was appointed executive director in February 2007 and assumed the leadership of NAEA June 1, 2007. Formerly the Deputy Executive Director of the National Association of Elementary School Principals (NAESP) in Alexandria, Virginia, Dr. Reeve brings to NAEA a proven record of association management and creative leadership in organizational development.

Driving a new NAEA Strategic Plan developed by the NAEA Board of Directors and other association leaders, she is building upon NAEA's rich legacy and historical successes toward organizational transformation to meet 21st century challenges. A strong advocate for the value of the visual arts in enriching the lives and endeavors of human beings, she has identified strategic initiatives that are aimed at championing and supporting art educators at every level while enhancing the "member experience" for all. Strategic initiatives include the development of a comprehensive communications plan, an overhaul of NAEA's information technology infrastructure and the design and implementation of a virtual community of practice in keeping with social connectivity trends. She is also working with NAEA's president and other leaders to review NAEA systems and structures including policy, governance and standards for the profession.

A former art educator, Dr. Reeve has taught at the preK-12 levels in both public and private schools and has held an adjunct faculty position in the graduate school at Lesley College in Cambridge, Massachusetts. She earned an undergraduate de-

gree in Art Education, and graduate work includes a Masters of Education degree in Secondary Education and Doctorate in Education with a focus on leadership and development. She has extensive experience as a presenter and consultant to national and international education organizations and is a practicing visual artist who regularly creates and exhibits her mixed media works on canvas and paper.

DR. OLIVIA GUDE

Dr. Olivia Gude is an artist and educator. She has created over 50 large-scale mural and mosaic projects, often working with inter-generational groups, teens, elders and children. She has created major works in Los Angeles; Madison, Wisconsin; DeKalb, Illinois; and Covington, Kentucky as well as many projects in the Chicago area. Gude specializes in collaborating with communities to transform public spaces. Gude is a member of the Senior Artist Circle of the Chicago Public Art Group and is an active member of the Illinois Arts Council Artist in Residency Program.

Gude has received many grants, commissions, and awards, including two National Endowment for the Arts grants to create public artworks, an Arts Midwest Regional Fellowship in Painting and a State of Illinois Fellowship for Outstanding Achievement in the Visual Arts. In 2000, she was chosen as one of 56 Artists and Communities: America Creates for the Millennium artists. In 2004, Gude was awarded a public art commission by the City of Chicago to create a mosaic for a Chicago Transit Authority station.

Gude is an Associate Professor in the School of Art and Design at the University of Illinois at Chicago. She is the Founder of the Spiral Workshop, an innovative program in which teens investigate contemporary community and personal issues through contemporary art practices. In 2002, Gude launched the Spiral Art Education Website, at http://spiral.aa.uic.edu, which publishes innovative theme-based curriculum projects.

Gude was appointed a UIC Great Cities Scholar in 2000 to develop the Contemporary Community Curriculum Initiative.

Through the CCC, supported by the Chicago Community Trust and the Illinois Arts Council, art teachers



collaboratively developed curriculum based on postmodern art and community issues. The article "Postmodern Principles: In Search of a 21st Century Art Education" that documents this research was nominated for the 2004 National Art Education Association Manuel Barkan Award. Gude has also received an Illinois Alliance for Arts Education Service Award for her contributions to the field of art education.

In 2006-2007, Gude was again appointed a Great Cities Scholar to create an NEA supported intergenerational mosaic project for the recently rehabbed Hilliard Apartment complex. Gude is also developing Creating Places, an event for urban planners, artists, city officials, educators, and others to come together to imagine creating more fanciful, beautiful places in Chicago communities.

Olivia Gude has published many articles on art education and on community public art. Her writing has appeared in Art Journal, Art Education: the Journal of the National Art Education Association, Journal of Cultural Research in Art Education, Feminist Studies Journal and Public Art Review as well as chapters in books, including Cultural Activisms: Poetic Voices, Political Voices and Real World Readings in Art Education. Her most recent documentation project supported by the Chicago Community Trust is the online Community Public Art Guide: Making Murals, Mosaics, Sculptures, and Spaces at http://cpag.net/home/.

Olivia Gude frequently presents lectures and workshops on the transformation of art education, introducing contemporary art to K-12 students, community art practices and on her work as a collaborative public artist. Gude has been the keynote speaker for state art education conferences in Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan and Minnesota as well as for the Ontario/Canadian Society for Education through Art conference.





WORKSHOP FEES AND REFUNDS

At the FAEA Conference—Workshop and Gala tickets, once purchased, are nonrefundable except under the following circumstances:

- 1. When paper pre-registration is used it is possible for a member to overpay for workshop reservations, e.g. the member's first choice is a \$60.00 workshop that is full. IMAGINE...WHIRLED PEACE

PINWHEELS FOR PEACE - AN ART AND LITERACY INSTALLATION PROJECT

Imagine...more than a million pinwheels spinning in the wind. Pinwheels in the United States, Great Britain, South America, Mexico, Australia, the Middle East, Canada, Africa, and Asia. Big pinwheels, small pinwheels, pinwheels of all shapes and sizes. Colorful pinwheels, decorated with drawings, paintings, collages, or photographs. Pinwheels with words of peace and harmony written on them. Fields of pinwheels, along roadsides, in school yards and in parks. This is the Pinwheels for Peace project!

Pinwheels for Peace is an art and literacy installation project started in 2005 as a way for students to express their feelings about what's going on in the world and in their lives. Art educators, teachers, scout groups, churches, and entire cities quickly embraced the project, which then became a meaningful and powerful art advocacy agent.

On September 21, 2007, people in over 3,000 locations throughout the world "planted" approximately a million pinwheels in public places in their communities, spreading thoughts and feelings about peace throughout the country and the world. This was the third year of the *Pinwheels for Peace* project. Now, we are preparing for September 21, 2008, year four, and this time we're

hoping to see more pinwheels EVERYWHERE!

Violence has become commonplace and accepted as part of our society and, for some students, it is a way of life. It is our hope that through the *Pinwheels for Peace* project, we can help our students make a public visual statement about their feelings about



war, peace, tolerance, cooperation, harmony, and unity and let people know what the next generation is thinking. This is not political. Peace doesn't have to be associated with war; it can be related to violence or intolerance in our daily lives and to peace of mind. Peace is what you feel in your heart.

Participating in the Pinwheels for Peace project is simple. Students create pinwheels of all shapes and sizes. As part of the creation process, the students write their thoughts about "war and peace, tolerance, and/or living in harmony with others" on one side. The writing can be poetry, prose, haiku, or essay-style, whatever writing form is appropriate as the students express themselves. On the other side, the students draw, paint, collage, etc. to visually express their feelings. They will assemble these pinwheels and on International Day of Peace, September 21, 2008, everyone will "plant" their pinwheels outside (at schools, museums, public places, etc.) as a public statement and art exhibit/installa-

Please join us on September 21, 2008 as we celebrate International Day of Peace with Whirled Peace! (Because September 21 falls on a Sunday this year, if you can't plant your pinwheels on that day, have your peace celebration on

September 22 or whatever day is appropriate to your situation.)

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LOCAL ARTIST AND ART EDUCATOR BRINGS 3 AM IDEA TO LIFE



The idea came to Jolie Spelman like many ideas do, at 3:00 am, when the day's activities are gone and tomorrows are yet to begin. The midnight awakenings are reminiscent of the early mornings spent in the rocking chair for the night time feedings of her children. Her mind wanders and is free to play out ideas yet to come. Spelman's early morning idea became *Legacy*, an exhibition that shows the impact art instructors have on the lives of their students, who themselves become teachers and continue the "legacy" of art.

"The intent of *Legacy* is to show the connection between the teacher and student," said Spelman. "The teacher instructs and then the student becomes the teacher. This is a theme that has been echoed time and time again in books, movies and now in *Legacy*."

Legacy became a reality when Spelman received a 2007 Professional Development Grant from the United Arts of Central Florida. With the grant funds, Spelman developed an exhibition of current and retired art teachers as well as current art students. The exhibit will be featured at The Loft at City Arts Factory in downtown Orlando, October 16-November 15, 2008.

"I wanted to show the connection between the art teacher and the student because art teachers inspire creativity in students. I am saddened to see schools placing less emphasis on the visual arts," Spelman said. "We are creating a society of visual cripples."

The artists featured in *Legacy* are Spelman herself, Gail Russakov, Grady Kimsey, Dottie Kaufmann and Carlos Marques. Spelman, who attended Seminole Community College and the University of Central Florida where she received a BS in Communications, a BA in Fine Arts and a BS in Art Education, taught high school for nine years. She has been teaching at the Interna-

tional Academy of Design and Technology in Orlando since 2002. She will be exhibiting a new series of abstract landscapes and mixed media collages. Russakov, a retired art teacher from Lake Brantley High School, is primarily a mixed media artist who now travels the country providing workshops. Her artistic style has influenced Spelman's mixed media work. Grady Kimsey is a former Seminole Community College instructor of Spelman's who is also now retired. His mixed media sculptures, ceramics and paintings have been exhibited at major venues throughout the United States.

Also in the exhibit will be Dottie Kaufmann and Carlos Marques, two students Spelman has taught while at the International Academy of Design and Technology. Kaufmann came to the International Academy in 2003 and received a BFA in Computer Graphic Design. Spelman and Kaufmann have collaborated on many designs both as a student and as instructors. Marques received an AS in Graphic Design from the International Academy of Design and Technology in 2006. He now teaches at the International Academy.

It still holds true that the legacy of the teacher and the teacher imparts knowledge to the student, who then becomes a teacher. This chain should not be broken. Its impact can be clearly seen in the art pieces that will be featured in *Legacy*.

Legacy will be featured at The Loft at City Arts Factory in downtown Orlando, October 16-November 15, 2008. The opening reception for Legacy, on October 16, 2008, coincides with the opening of the 2008 Florida Art Education Association (FAEA) Conference. Conference attendees will have the opportunity to attend the opening reception and see the exhibition developed by Spelman.

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
