
Workshop Fees and Refunds

- 1. Workshop, tour, box lunch and Gala tickets, once purchased, are non-refundable except under the following circumstances:
- 2. When paper pre-registration is used it is possible for a member to overpay for workshop reservations, e.g. the member's first choice is a \$40.00 workshop that is full.
