This year's FAEA Conference will be held in Jacksonville and the Duval County Art Teachers Association under the direction of Jack Matthews are putting together a great conference that you do not want to miss. The Florida Art Education Association has a strong history of representing art teachers throughout the state of Florida for 54 years. In 1996, FAEA's membership reached 1,000 members. In the past 8 years FAEA membership has averaged 800 members. Currently, there are over 2,000 art teachers in the state of Florida. My goal during my term as President is to increase membership to 1,200 FAEA members by January 2008 and I need your help to make this happen. Lastly, I want to share with you a book that I highly recommend all visual art teachers read. The book is *A Whole New Mind* by Daniel Pink. This book tells the story of why the right-brainers will rule the future, how the new MFA is the MBA, and why artists, inventors, designers, storytellers, caregivers, consolers, and big picture thinkers will be in great demand. 

HIGH SCHOOL DIVISION

Hello High School Art Educators. Summer is coming to a close. I hope you took the time to relax, vacation, create your own art, read a good book, sleep in, and enjoy the time away from school. Summer also provides a good time to look back at the past year and evaluate, research new ideas, order next year's materials, and plan for the upcoming year.

As I was thinking about this past year and what was accomplished by the students here in Highlands County, the thought of the elements of art came into mind and a question came to me. What is the condition of your ELEMENTS OF ART in your art education plans?

Are your lesson plans in LINE? Are they straightforward (horizontal) and directed (vertical) for student success and learning? Are they interesting (curved) and induce creative use of emotion? Do they allow for individual thinking (diagonal) and artistic freedom (zigzag)? Do your plans take students from artistic structure (contour line) to artistic personal expression (gesture) to free exploration of art (implied lines)?

How do you SHAPE and FORM your art students? Are they precise and sharply defined (geometric) and reflect the free-flowing (organic) aspects of growth? Our students come in many shapes and forms – positive and negative, etc. It is the job of every art teacher to strive to teach all of them to the best of our abilities.

All the things you see around you are illuminated in VALUE. Does the value of your teaching show depth in art education? Does the value of your student's art work shine in your community? The art work of our students must shine forth to those around us (i.e., other students, parents, administrators, and the public) as an example of the true value of art education.

One of the most exciting and powerful aspects of our environment is COLOR. Color appeals directly to our senses and emotions. Do your teaching methods fill your student's education with the full spectrum

of color? As art educators we have the ability to seek artistic exploration of subjects from a beautiful sunrise to the fading light of day.

SPACE is all around us. We are located and moving in space. Space is both positive and negative. Your understanding of space may depend on your point of view and perspective. Is your teaching space organized to illicit creativity from many perspectives and points of view?

TEXTURE is how an object feels or looks like it might feel if touched. Artists use many materials to express their ideas. Each of these has a unique textural surface. We, as art educators, use many methods to teach our art students. Each student has their own personality and creates their own unique and personal art.

This summer I have had some great art opportunities. I was in San Francisco and was able to see some great art, atmosphere, and culture. I saw the splendor of wine country

craftspeople at the Wharf, the Monet exhibit at the Legion of Honor Art Museum, some really good local galleries and I was able to spend a few hours with a glass blower. Monet was awesome with his garden scenes and landscapes of Normandy. The most memorable had to be the art of Dr. Seuss. His creative understanding of the child in all of us seems to always draw a smile and put a giggle in our heart. This is what is so great about teaching art. The lasting effects of art on the hearts and minds of the children we teach are fantastic! Art is everywhere and always a part of our lives. SUPERVISION/ADMINISTRATION DIVISION GOING FOR A RIDE

If you believe that ART is a process, then you will always enjoy the many exciting ways to teach and share art. We have heard this concept in many different ways from several different people.....that art is a way of looking at and doing things in a series of experiences and experiments to create something new and fresh. It is wonderful to have so many Art Supervisors and Resource Teachers who were able to share ideas from their counties for this article.

Ellen Harvey from Port Charlotte is new to us and already bringing many worthwhile ideas. She describes her *Learning Communities* planned for the 2006-07 school year as a way to mentor and assist teachers. As a second initiative, Ellen planned a teacher-to-teacher classroom visit for this fall which gets teachers into each others' classrooms.

In Brevard County, we started a Learning Community in 2005-06 during which we read Elliott Eisner's *The Arts and Creation of Mind*. It is truly a thought provoking book and well worth the time spent reading, discussing, and sharing personal experiences together. I always believe that teachers cover more areas than they realize within art lessons and it was obvious to me that learning communities were a great time to bring shared experiences into the open. Another beautiful feature in Learning Communities is that the group leader shifts with each session allowing everyone the opportunity to lead the discussion.

Cindy Balistreri shared two popular paid professional development opportu-

nities that were offered to her teachers in Sarasota County. The first was an annual 30 hour workshop which focused on the Standards Driven Lesson Design. Grouped by levels, elementary, middle, and high school, teachers came together to analyze their curriculum, discuss and create assessments, share lesson plans, and analyze lessons using specific protocol. If that wasn't exciting by itself for teachers, this year the focus will be on Curriculum Mapping.

In Brevard and Broward Counties, there is an emphasis on strengthening AP Studio programs within the secondary schools. Several Brevard art teachers attended the AP Conference in Orlando in July. Broward County Public Schools with the Museum of Art Fort Lauderdale presented the 2006 Superintendent's Advanced Placement Studio Art Exhibition at the Museum in conjunction with the King Tut show March 27-April 3, 2006. Original works from thirty-nine talented AP high school students were showcased. Four students received top honors and were awarded \$1,000.00 each from the Arts for the Future Scholarship Fund and a full scholarship to the Museum's Studio Art Summer Program. Over the summer, interested Broward County art teachers participated in a week-long AP Studio Art workshop. If you would like more information on these events in Broward County, feel free to contact Marla D. Armstrong, Art Supervisor, Broward County.

The Manatee County Summer Leadership Institute offered a seminar entitled How the Arts Benefit Student Achievement. The workshop was facilitated by Dr. Sherry Lawrence, Curriculum Specialist, and Judy Griffin and tackled questions such as: "Why is it so important to keep arts strong in our schools?"; "How does the study of art fit into No Child Left Behind?"; "How can evidence-based action and advocacy make a compelling "'Arts' Case for schools?". In Collier County, the Naples Museum of Art hosted two docent-led tours for teachers, one show featured Frank Lloyd Wright, and the other, Andrew Wyeth and Family. In addition to receiving instructional materials, each teacher received the book *Frank Lloyd Wright, The Interactive Portfolio*. A generous Museum donor graciously supplied busses for the event. Brevard County launched a *Traveling Art Museum* in August 2006. The project was designed in conjunction with the Brevard Museum of Art and Science. The Museum donated artifacts from their permanent exhibit and constructed the packaging for transportation to and from schools. A team of two elementary and two high school teachers wrote the lesson plans. Teachers can sign up to receive the *Traveling Art Museum* and they can add their own lesson plans to it. with Anna Wells, of the Tampa Museum of Art, and Artist/Storyteller Wade Slater, students at Mary E. Bryant Elementary School created the Legend of the Bryant Bronco. Together they wrote the story and illustrated a book. Then taking scenes from the book, students illustrated a table that will be used as a reading center in the school's media center. The table was on display, along with other schools' work, at the Tampa Children's Board Building. Also on display at the TECO Gallery of the Children's Board was a traveling exhibition of student work from the Discover What Art Is. After the above exhibit, the work was moved to the Tampa Museum of Art to be on display there for a month. Then, at the start of this school year, the table was moved back to Mary E. Bryant Elementary for the children to enjoy. Great work, Mr. Bliss and his students!

Betsy Gordon, of Rawlings Elementary in Hillsborough County, shares what has been going on at her school. They have been working on The Enamel Project which was done with an area artist by the name of Mary Klein. Since Rawlings Elementary has a writing focus, Ms. Gordon came up with the idea of having each class choose their favorite book and then do sketches illustrating the story. All grades, from K-5, were offered the opportunity to participate. The students created over forty 10" by 10" panels, with the older students transferring their own drawings and paintings to the surface with a specialized enamel water color. Mary then took the panels back to her studio to fire. This project was funded by

the school's PTSA, which bought the panels and fund part of Mary's time (although she was very generous, donating lots of her precious time). The panels were shown at the Art Space Gallery as part of a Kids' Art Show in many of the downtown Tampa galleries. Now the panels will be placed permanently throughout the school, so as visitors walk through the school they will see a reflection of the writing and literary emphasis of Rawlings Elementary. There will be a plaque explaining the project and each piece of art will have the name of the book, author, and the classes that did the drawings. Metal Smithing Magazine published an article about the project and the strength of artists in the community working in the

It is so exciting to see so much great education in the arts happening in our elementary schools and the ways art teachers are incorporating literacy into their art programs! Thank you to everyone who sent me their news and information.


RECIPE FOR A CLASSIC


HAVE YOU CLAIMED YOUR RIGHTFUL PLACE IN TEACHING **CREATIVITY?**

Politicians, school board members, principals, and parents are looking for ways to teach children creativity. As I hear public debate about our children's needs the word "creativity" often is used as if it is the solution to all problems. No doubt it is. However the word "art" is seldom, if ever used. What better way to teach creativity than through art?

Perhaps we could leverage the natural asset of our curriculum by focusing on the breath of the overarching goal of creative thinking. Corporate brain trusts recognize and utilize the natural potential of art to expand creativity.

It's time for us to market just how we do this with specific examples that show how a child makes the leap from usual to extraordinary. Could we put together a few irrefutable examples? We all observe the magic of the creative leap daily. We must show others what we do to set the stage that makes creativity happen. Even those who know art teaches creativity need to see how we do it!

remind me about some misconceptions often

observed in the academic classroom. Sometimes we need to clarify the notion of "creativity." I've often found that teachers and the preservice teachers I now work with often think of creativity as something vague or as a natural gift. This quotation by Robert Schirmaccher says it well: "Creativity is an attitude, not an aptitude." It is this "attitude" that executives want to capture as they hire individuals expected to make significant contributions in the workplace.

In our art classrooms, we know well that students can be challenged to think independently as they solve problems during the preparation and making of art. What I seldom see in the academic classroom, is truly independent thinking supported by observation, knowledge, reason, and experiment. What I frequently see, is a simple distribution of art materials, with the thought that students will naturally be creative, by just experimenting and/or pushing paint around without a purpose. We wouldn't expect a two-year-old to just bang on a piano forever; doesn't that child deserve to know something of the structure, power, and joy of music? This is of course true in art as well.

In promoting art education, we can do much in our own teaching areas to demonstrate and showcase true creativity. I know this is being done across Florida; won't you share your examples with Fresh Paint? Examples can be sent to Nan Williams at nwilliam@mail.ucf.edu.

ABOUT ROBERT

My passion for books took an unexpected twist after a trip to a new dentist. On a previous visit to have a cavity filled (my second passion being candy) my old dentist didn't numb my tooth enough and I began to howl with pain. My mother came running in and with a scowl at the dentist whisked me away never to return. Arriving at the new dentist's office I was understandably scared. Noticing a wicker basket filled with books my mother suggested I bring one over for us to share while we waited. I went to the basket and realized right away that these books were special. They were very thick and had hard covers, which to me meant they were expensive. I opened the first one and was shocked and delighted when something leapt right off the page. It was a pop-up book! I was so excited I forgot all about the dentist.

Shortly after that, my mother brought home some old, manila filing folders from Ford Motor Company where she worked during the day as a secretary. The folders were perfect for making pop-ups. Everyone started giving me pop-up books as birthday or holiday gifts and soon I was able to make simple pop-ups by carefully examining these books.

Throughout middle school and high school I continued to improve as an artist and left Michigan after graduating to attend Pratt Institute in New York City to study art. During my junior year at Pratt I did an internship at Dial Books for Young Readers. I learned everything about how a children's book is created, but more importantly I fetched the mail. I'm sure this may not seem very exciting but it is when the mail you're opening is original artwork from Barbara Cooney, Thomas Locker, and James Marshall! I decided then and there that I would be a children's book illustrator.

Today I work in my studio in New York City that I share with my partner, children's book creator Matthew Reinhart. We love making books. It's hard work but the best

part is not having to worry about making a mess. When being an artist is your job, you can make as many messes as you want to!



TARGETING TRENDS, STYLES, AND EVERYTHING SHAPING ART EDUCATION

"Who dares to teach must never cease to learn." *John Cotton Dana, American librarian and museum director,* 1856-1929.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

It's training for the art teacher. Strategies for teaching art now include countless buzzwords, such as cooperative learning, problem-solving skills, critical-thinking skills, collaboration techniques, reading in the content area, and assessments. Their definitions promise the improvement of information literacy in students whether through written or visual communication. The ensuing discussion is not all-inclusive nor an endorsement, but is provided as a beginning dialogue for discussion and investigation into the array of professional development opportunities in post-college teacher education. It is all about student achievement, and it all falls on the teacher to implement.

So is Professional Development the Motive for Recertification, Reassurance, or Refreshment?

ON CERTIFICATION

The State of Florida Department of Education Web site at http://fldoe.org has many links to assist new or veteran teachers as well as individuals from out-of-state, new graduates, those changing careers, or high school graduates considering the teaching profession.

ON RECERTIFICATION

Every teacher must apply for *recertification* by earning semester hours of college credit or its equivalent during each renewal period. At http://fldoe.org/edcert/, click on "Renewing a Florida Professional Certificate" to find general information and appropriate categories for renewal, including, but not limited to:

- Content specific to the subject area(s)
- Methods or education strategies specific to the subject area(s)
- $\bullet \quad \hbox{Computer literacy, computer applications, and computer education} \\$
- · Classroom Strategies

To access the dates of the validity period or to find out the status of an application, go to http://fldoe.org/edcert/public.asp and type in your first initial and last name. For "Specialization Requirements for Certification in Art (Grades K-12) – Academic Class" go to http://www.fldoe.org/edcert/rules/6A-4-0101.asp. For frequently asked

questions on certification, visit http://fldoe.org/edcert/faqs.asp#10. It is important for new teachers to remember that the Temporary Certification is nonrenewable and only covers the first three years of teaching, and then teachers need to apply for Professional Certification. When moving, notify the certification office within 30 days.

ON PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Professional development is reassurance for the teacher who participates, fills voids of knowledge in various topics, and gains the needed support to teach more effectively. Fortunately, many schools and districts provide year-round opportunities and topics such as classroom management, differentiated instruction, multiple intelligences, or technology applications. Districts also make available groups like Marzano and Associates (http://www.marzanoandassociates.com/) that advocate school reform to enhance student achievement through systematic interventions, strategies for classroom instruction, and vocabulary development. Another group headed by Dr. Willard R. Daggett (http://www.daggett.com/ or www.LeaderEd.com) has customized a Curriculum Matrix for Florida standards in order to align them with tests and essential skills for improving instruction and student achievement.

WHERE TO GO, HOW TO START

At county school board Web sites, many districts offer online courses from nearby community colleges or other sources to assist teachers in fulfilling their certification needs. Often such courses are self-paced and may vary in points from a couple to 20 or more per course. Some are free through the district staff development department while others are not. Many online courses require weekly participation in teacher-directed student activities and in discussion boards for course completion and acquisition of points.

- Counties may have purchased online courses from Broward County Schools Virtual University implemented through TRAIN U (Training Resource and Instructional Network) using Blackboard for computer access. Courses may last seven weeks or more and may be offered throughout the year.
- Sculptural Bookmaking (creating 3D books as art)
- Art & Beyond: Elementary (interdisciplinary approaches)

- *Inclusion in Art* (classroom management, lesson planning, and laws concerning special needs students)
- Art Magic: Middle (artists, art history, and art media)
- Reading Strategies for Art, Music, and Physical Education Teachers: Elementary
- ESOL Training for art educators is the Level III Training and assists teachers in understanding the difficulties non-English speaking students face while learning strategies for supporting their learning. http://www.firn.edu/doe/omsle/timeline.htm
- Clinical Educator Training and subsequent certification is necessary for teachers who want to have junior or senior interns or want to mentor new teachers through the peer teacher program. http://www.firn.edu/doe/profdev/clined.htm
- CRISS Training instructs teachers on strategies for organizing student learning to promote student independency through personal involvement in the learning process. http://www.proiectcriss.com/
- Guided Study Modules are available from the staff development office and are an easy way to earn inservice points by using a self-paced module containing materials, activities, and components to increase professional knowledge and to develop and implement newly learned skills into daily teaching.
- Group Study: The Annenberg/CPB Channel at www.learner. org makes use of telecommunications technologies to produce educational video programs such as *The Arts in Every Classroom:* A Workshop for Elementary School Teachers and The Arts in Every Classroom: A Video Library K-5. These videos coordinate with Web and print materials to increase expertise in understanding art and learning how to improve teaching methods. View or call 1-800-LEARNER for a complete listing of on-demand professional development videos. Email them at info@learner.org to request a catalogue or receive email.
- Teacher-to-Teacher Initiative from the USDOE Summer Workshops is designed to improve academic performance through increased content knowledge and pedagogical skill. http://www.paec.org/teacher2teacher/index.asp
- 2006-2007 is the art textbook adoption year, which prompts counties to offer professional development in conjunction with publishers for teaching educators how to use the text, materials, technology, and peripherals effectively.

WHAT ARE THE COSTS

Courses provided through the district staff development department or particular museums are free to teachers. Some training even provides stipends to teachers. Also, check on local community college course fee waivers throughout the year. Often a district will purchase a limited number of spaces for out-of-district online training offered by companies or organizations such as the following:

For the sixth summer art education graduate and undergraduate students and current teachers have participated in ARE 4453 and ARE 5454 Studio Experiences in Art Education at the Atlantic Center for the Arts in New Smyrna Beach, Florida. This unheralded partnership between UCF's College of Education at the Orlando and

Daytona Beach campuses and Atlantic Center for the Arts began in 2000. These 10-day intensive 5-class hour per day sessions provide future and current art educators an opportunity to advance their studio learning and appreciation of contemporary art and aesthetics. Like Penland or Arrowmont, at the Atlantic Center students stay on-site and have access to the studios 24 hours a day for 10 days. These experiences can be the foundation for what they will later teach their students in public schools.

It is fair to say that the Atlantic Center for the Arts has made significant in-kind contributions to the Art Education program and to the quality of art education in Central Florida. They have charged but a fraction of the normal facility rentals and utilities and provide very nice single accommodations at half price for our students.

This course and the Atlantic Center has been the subject of a number of national, regional and state conference presentations. We hope to continue to build this valuable relationship.

I have been painting as a pre-schooler and throughout school, but in third grade I won First Place out of all third graders in the Walton Country Fair and also won First Place for all grade levels. I would like to thank Mrs. Constance Rogers a.k.a. Mrs. Art, who was my art teacher and is a great

friend. She gets credit for most of the art contests I have entered. In the fourth grade, my artwork was selected for the Florida PRIDE! program, a program sponsored by First Lady Columba Bush and Lt. Governor Toni Jennings in collaboration with ACE/ FAAE and VSA arts of Florida. The program, open to all Florida students in grades K-12, provides the opportunity for a Florida student to have their artwork featured on the cover of a holiday card for the Governor and Mrs. Bush or the Lt. Governor. The Lt. Governor had selected my Manatee to grace the cover of her holiday card in 2004. I was enormously honored and thrilled about my artwork being picked. Then the following year, the Secretary of the Florida Department of Transportation, Denver Stutler, Jr., selected my artwork, Cultural Evolution, for the cover of their 2006 calendar. I appreciated that Secretary Stutler stated that my work was picked on its own merits, not because I am disabled. That encouraged me to consider more possibilities of what I could do with my artwork.

Now I donate some of my paintings to organizations that help preserve and bring awareness to endangered species. Some of my paintings are of a manatee, sea turtles, and wolves to bring awareness to protecting these wonderful endangered creatures that God has shared and entrusted us with to take care of. Not only do I want to help animals, but more importantly I want to help people. I donated a painting to the Rehabilitation Department of the UAB Children's Hospital in Birmingham, Alabama. Dr. Charlie Law and his team of professionals trained me and my family to live with a spinal cord injury and ventilators. I depicted

myself with one of our horses to encourage people to enjoy living. One of my "sayings" is "I LOVE MY LIFE!" I have chosen to love living.

My writing along with my illustrations have created a short story to help bring awareness and funds to Southeastern Guide Dogs, Inc. with the hopes that more people can receive guide dogs. The Sandestin Lions Club International and Leos Club have used some of my paintings depicting lions to make note cards to fund raise towards Southeastern Guide Dogs, Inc. I have been blessed to receive a guide dog of my own named Lily and understand personally the security and benefits of how important these fabulous dogs are in peoples lives. They can open up someone's world in a huge way.

Then, with my writing, artwork, and public speaking I was able to help bring awareness and funds to the Catch-A-Dream Foundation. This foundation sponsors outdoor adventures for children with high disabilities or who are chronically ill. After my whitetail adventure they asked me to write about my dream adventure and told me that they would publish it. It took me over a year to write and illustrate my story about my whitetail adventure. I donated my story and illustrations to the Catch-A-Dream Foundation, which arrived to them coincidently right before their Fifth Annual Celebrity Golf Tournament. They invited me to speak at their event and to tell of my dream hunt. I spoke to over five hundred people and shared what a great hunt they had sponsored for me. I was excited and extremely nervous when doing my speech,

but I knew that I needed to do it. There wasn't time to publish my story before the event, but they auctioned a single copy of my story and it raised three thousand dollars. That turns out to be the amount it takes to sponsor one adventure for a child. Needless to say, they are going to publish the story and it will help sponsor more dream outdoor adventures for children. As I wrote and illustrated the story, I had hoped it would help send a child on a dream hunt or fishing trip. It was so fulfilling to actually see it come to pass. The Catch-A-Dream Foundation is also in the process of making note cards from some of my artwork to fundraise to send more children on a trip of a lifetime.

"I have a paintbrush and I'm not afraid to use it!" is a saying I have used. I wear a sun visor with a brush sticking out from the brim, like a sword, to paint by moving

my head around. I paint with watercolors or acrylics. I'm paralyzed from below the shoulders and that's why I paint this way. The point I am trying to make is improvise, use what ever you have and do not be afraid or if you are afraid do it anyway. I want to use anything I can to make a difference in people's lives. I like art very much, but there are other things I like more such as science and math. I am looking forward to the possibilities of using those tools to make a difference. I am so very grateful to God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit for giving me gifts to use and grow with. I am grateful and respect the organizations and people I have mentioned in this article as making a difference in my life and other people's lives. I don't want to just talk about what I do, but I sincerely hope everyone will reflect on what they can do and have done to make a difference.

In Memory Of ... CHARLES DORN

Florida State University art-education professor, scholar, and abstract painter Charles M. Dorn was passionate about art right up to the end. Even as he approached his 80th birthday, Dorn did not think of retiring from Florida State University. In May, he was working out the details of hanging several of his large, colorful abstract canvases at the University Center Club in Tallahassee when he collapsed at home. Dorn died Monday, June 26, 2006 at the age of 79.

Charles M. Dorn received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from George Peabody/Vanderbilt and his Ed.D. from the University of Texas, Austin. He had been a Professor of Art Education for 56 years, a painter, and author. He is an honored recipient of the

25th Anniversary Award for distinguished service by the National Gallery of Art, 1966, and the 2003 National Art Educator of the Year amongst his many accomplishments. Since 1986, he was Profes-

sor of Art Education and Director of the Arts Administration Program at Florida State University. He also previously headed the Art Departments at Cal State Northridge and Purdue University. He was an exhibiting artist as well

and has shown his work in various solo and group exhibitions. In addition, he has written many books on Arts Education.

He is survived by his wife of 48 years,

Virginia Jo Dorn, his daughter Mary Jan Dorn and son-in-law Robert Mason of New York, NY, and son Charles M. Dorn Jr., daughter-in-law Linda Romanowski, and





Art Education: The Development of Public Policy

Art Education: The Development of Public Policy provides a socio-political analysis of American K-12 art education policy from 1850 to the beginning of the twenty-first century. It seeks to acquaint the reader with effects of government and foundation policy interventions on the curriculum of K-12 art schooling, the influences of these policies on how we view art and artists. and how art educators are governed by the policymaking process.

Historically the book provides a 50-year overview of art education curriculum reform from a policy perspective through the identification of various federal and private efforts to influence the K-12 art curriculum, the policy windows which provided the political opportunities to initiate sometimes unwanted curricular changes and the special interests outside the field who have sought to imitate change.

The text presents various examples of public policy interventions, monopolies, and rules initiated by governments and foundations in order to insure compliance with conceptions of how the artist lost its aura and how it was replaced by current policies advocating the art student as a social change agent and social

reconstructionist. Put at risk by this process was the time honored idea of the progressives that the child should be educated as the artist and that K-12 art education is to foster creative learning.

JACK LEW NAMED 3 RD GENERAL SESSION SPEAKER FOR 2007 NAEA CONVENTION



Excerpts from the General Session Speech at the 2006 NAEA Convention in Chicago

WHY ART EDUCATION...

Here's the tragedy. That which becomes natural and normal to every child is virtually programmed out of a child because of the way in which we treat art once those children get to school. What I'm here today to do is probably not to make a case for the arts, because I think that there's no need of that in this room.

Every one of you are passionately committed to the idea that every child should have an arts education. But what I would want to do is to talk about how do we get this country to wake up and realize that the dumbest possible thing it could do, in an economy that is moving away from a manufacturing economy to a creative economy, that the dumbest thing it could do is to make massive cuts in art and music programs.

And that the smartest thing it could do is to realize that there's no greater investment in the lifetime of a student than helping that student to fulfill all of the gifts and talents that are deeply within. And that any student who is going to be successful is a student that will have not simply a grounding in math and science and reading, all of which I passionately push in my state as a governor, but I do not do it to the exclusion of the arts for the simple reason that we are not trying to create one dimensional children in a world in which they simply are programmed to print back what they have been programmed in.

What we truly need is a nation filled with creative people who have the imagination necessary to come up with the ideas that will build the next generation's economy.

ON THE CREATIVE ECONOMY. . .

I'm sure that most of you here have read Richard Florida's book, *The Rise Of The Creative Class*, and while you may or may not agree with all of the conclusions that Florida comes to in terms of recognizing where society is going, it's inescapable to recognize that we are seriously changing in our economic model. And that we are competing in a different kind of economy.

Tom Freedman said it best, "the world is flat, there are things that are changing, many of the jobs that we now have taken

for granted are going to countries halfway around the world." We can wring our hands and talk about how terrible that is, we can try to put up fences and borders, or we can do what Americans have always done.

It's always had the resilience to try to be creative and come up with where the economy is going and get there first. But the one thing that we can be assured of is that it is a creative generation, a generation who can think, imagine, and create new things that have not even been imagined yet that will truly build the next generation's economy and give us any hope of maintaining our place as an economic power house. For that reason alone, there is a tremendous value in having an arts education for every student in America.

I think I could make the case to any Chamber of Commerce group, to any business group, to any group interested in the future economic viability of the United States, that an investment in arts education is valid and valuable.

But I would be somehow missing the point if I didn't also say that there is a tremendous value and validity in an arts education simply because without the arts, this would be an incredibly boring world in which to live.

And I always want to be careful that I never come to the places of saying that the only validity of the arts is that it has some kind of productivity model that the reason it is because it produces something of economic value.

ART FOR ART'S SAKE. . .

If you remember Eugene Levy's role in the movie, Waiting for Guffman--I hope you have seen it. But in the little town in Missouri they're doing a play, and Eugene Levy who is the dentist who gets a role in the community play, makes this interesting comment.

And the tag line for the movie was essentially this: There's a good reason that some talent remains undiscovered. Well, maybe that's true, there's a good reason that some talent remains undiscovered. But I'd like to think that there's a greater tragedy when there's a lot of talent in America that remains untouched and untapped.

And unfortunately that's what's happening. In this country we put an incredible premium on the people who can hit a curve ball, and there's nothing wrong with hitting

a curve ball.

But by the same token, there's something incredibly right about being able to hit the right note on a sheet of music. There's nothing wrong with a girl who knows how to pitch, but there's something incredibly right as well about a girl who knows how to paint. There's nothing wrong with a child who can perhaps find the right steps to make the soccer team, but there's nothing wrong for the student who learns the right steps so that one day they can be on dancing with the stars.

There's an incredible volume of kids in our schools who probably are never going to be football players or basketball players or soccer players or tennis players. But if somebody would just put a musical instrument in their hands, or a paint brush in their hands or a script in their hands, they've got the potential not only of bringing extraordinary pleasure, joy and empowerment to other people, but they most importantly have the prospect of unlocking something deep within their soul that nothing else will unlock, but their personal involvement in the value of the arts.

ON GETTING ARTS INTO THE SCHOOLS...

I'm fully convinced that the void of arts is primarily being experienced by many state budgets because the policy makers simply do not get it. They do believe that arts are expendable, extra curricular or extraneous.

And it is our job to make sure that they understand that, as the introduction said, and I often say, they are none of those things. They are essential. And they are essential for every student in every school in every community in America.

The problem is, how do we get from where we are where it's often simply an elective, an option, a maybe for a handful of kids in larger schools with big budgets, to where it is an absolute guaranteed to every student in every school in every hamlet across America, how do we get there?

And to be honest with you, we don't get there by simply appreciating the value of the arts. We get there when we get the attention of policy makers and elected officials in and help them to understand that this is an issue that is in sync with their best political interest. Nine out of the 10 parents surveyed in this country believe it is wrong to cut funding for the arts. There's not a

politician in this country who does not understand a 90% approval of an issue.

They may not understand the arts, they do understand poll numbers and percentages. And we need to put that in their face, day after day and remind them that if they cut the arts, that there's only 10% of the population out there that really appreciates what they've done and they've ticked off 90%, and we're going to make sure that 90% know it.

ON ADVOCACY...

I'm going to be very up front, blunt and honest with you. It is not enough to go to legislature and ask them to think about it. We need to kindly, respectfully, but forcefully ask of our governors and legislators that they include it in the mandated core curriculum of every school, because here's the reality.

We only fund what we force. Never forget that. If we don't force it, we don't fund it. And if we don't fund it, it doesn't happen. And the reason that we've got to force it is because then we will fund it. And when we fund it, it will actually start happening for those students out there.

It was a democrat legislator named Pat Bond who worked with me on our bill in Arkansas. We wanted to make sure that it was not only bipartisan, but that it included all kinds of folks, black, white, democrat, republican, because that is an issue that transcends all the normal boundaries of politics. You'll find people that you think would naturally be with us around, people who you think would be against us are instead with us.

Turn on that coalition and get them going, and get the legislation. States already have some that could be used as a model in your states. Go to key legislators, tell them that you will see to it that there are dozens, if not hundreds of art educators and art advocates, that are at the Capitol the day this is presented, that can generate hundreds of e-mails and calls and letters that are kindly and encouragingly supporting the measure. The reason that it is so critical that we not only have the curriculum that's mandated, but we also insist that it be taught by certified art teachers for this reason.

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GUERRILLA GIRLS NAMED 4TH GENERAL SESSION SPEAKERS FOR 2007 NAEA CONVENTION

In 1985, a group of women artists founded the Guerrilla Girls. They assumed the names of dead women artists and wore gorilla masks in public, concealing their identities and focusing on the issues rather than their personalities. Between 1985 and 2000, close to 100 women, working collectively and anonymously, produced posters, billboards, public actions, books and other projects to make feminism funny and fashionable. At the turn of the millennium, three separate and independent incorporated groups formed to bring fake fur and feminism to new frontiers.


"We're a bunch of anonymous females who take the names of dead women artists as pseudonyms and appear in public wearing gorilla masks. We have produced posters, stickers, books, printed projects, and actions that expose sexism and racism in politics, the art world, film and the culture at large. We use humor to convey information, provoke discussion, and show that feminists can be funny. We wear gorilla masks to focus on the issues rather than our personalities. Dubbing ourselves the conscience of culture, we declare ourselves feminist counterparts to the mostly male

tradition of anonymous do-gooders like Robin Hood, Batman, and the Lone Ranger. Our work has been passed around the world by kindred spirits who we are proud to have as supporters. It has also appeared in The New York Times, The Nation, Bitch and Bust; on TV and radio, including NPR, the BBC and CBC; and in countless art and feminist texts. The mystery surrounding our identities has attracted attention. We could be anyone; we are everywhere."



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


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
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
