SUPERVISION/ADMINISTRATION DIVISION

ARTS INTEGRATION

Arts Integration brings student learning into focus. With or without a camera when students participate in the learning process across the curriculum they become active learners. How many times have we heard that? However, with Daniel Pink's widely acclaimed new book, *A Whole New Mind*, a resurgence of bringing enlightened right-brain involvement has returned.

It is not just about using a hands-on approach anymore, but rather looking at education differently. For instance education can focus on combining seemingly unrelated ideas into something new to learn the subtleties of human nature. Arts integration fits the dynamics of this thinking. I hope we ride the wave for a long time, creating real believers and effecting a genuine philosophical educational change.

Ronald McNair Middle School for the Performing Arts in Brevard County has used arts integration as a catalyst to ignite learning. First a successful magnet school for math and science, McNair recently has expanded their horizons to include a school wide magnet for the performing arts. Dr. Mary Palmer, University of Central Florida, has been instrumental in helping McNair integrate the arts.

This year alone the staff has engaged in a monthly faculty meeting to share professional development in arts integration thanks to the administrative support of Mrs. Rosette Brown, Principal. Teachers have also come on board with projects that beguile the faint hearted.

This year there was a school wide Greek Festival showcasing Greek literature, history, and philosophers in Tableau. Students used math formulas initiated by the Greeks. In science, they studied the composition of volcanoes while locating Mt. Olympus. At the festival students dressed in traditional garb and there was Greek music, cuisine, theatre, and dance. The art classes engaged in studying Greek art, creating some of the scenery effects, and producing watercolors of beautiful aquatic life and surrounding waters.

In another venue during the year, the halls of McNair came alive with mural artist Mike Bryant from the Brevard Cultural Alliance who worked with students to celebrate the arts and sports. The windows of the cafeteria are now adorned with dramatic full window size reminders of their school magnet theme.


Another striking example of full integration was from a study of the history behind the Gee's Bend quilters. Dr. Palmer prepared students and together they took a field trip to the Orlando Museum of Art. The docents remarked on how well prepared the students were to ask the questions and participate in the discussions. In preparation, students worked in pairs to create their own quilt based on a novel they read for language arts. Initially they created quilt

pieces with colored masking tape and documented what their quilt piece represented. In math class they learned the math behind quilting designs. In Life Choices or careers class students learned how to sew. In the style of the Gee's Bend quilters students brought in clothing that they cut up to create the school wide quilt. The community was also involved with community quilters assisting with the sewing.

All of the above and more represent the school wide arts integration and the administrations' dedication to the arts. Ronald McNair Middle School was also recognized by the Florida Alliance for Arts Education as an Arts Achieve Model School. ARTIST TRADING CARDS

Artist trading cards, also known as ATCs, are 2 ½ x 3 ½ inch (64 x 89 mm) miniature works of art which artists trade with one another, similar to the way people trade sports cards. ATCs are a relatively new art form which formally began in September 1996. The concept was created by Swiss artist M. Vänçi Stirnemann. [1] They can be any medium: pencil, watercolor, acrylic, oil, collage, scratch board, mixed media - anything the creative mind of the artist can think up. Artist Trading Cards are produced as originals, as limited editions, or as a series.

Conceptually ATCs are about exchanging art without the interface of the art world and without money being involved. Artists trade their cards in face-to-face trading sessions as well as via mail. Artists who trade by mail often make their arrangements online and/or through e-mail. In some ATC artists' opinions, trading cards by mail is a diminished experience when compared to an ATC Trading Session.

RULES OF ATCS

There are only two true rules applied to modern Artist Trading Cards:

- 1. The dimensions of the card must be 2.5 x 3.5 inches (64 x 89 mm).
- 2. The cards must be traded never bought or sold.

Artist Trading Cards are typically made on a base of card stock, although this is not mandatory. ATCs have been created on metal, stiffened fabric, plastic, clay, balsa wood, leather, embroidery canvas, acetate, heavy watercolor paper, and many other materials. Various techniques are then applied to the chosen canvas: collage, assemblage, digital art, calligraphy, beadwork, watercolors, rubber stamps, carved soft block stamps, pen and ink, colored pencil, airbrush, and many others. The back of the card typically includes the artist's signature, the date, and sometimes the number (if the card is part of an edition or series), and title. If part of an organized swap, it is common for people to add the name of the swap and sometimes the name of the swap host.

A FEW ATC TIPS:

- The back of your cards should contain your name, any contact information you wish to provide, and the number or series of the card. Some artists start numbering their cards with number 1, and just keep going. Others will do series numbering, such as 1 of 7 or 1/7. How you number is totally up to you.
- Dimensional embellishment is acceptable, but remember that your finished card must fit into a standard trading card sleeve. Making cards larger than the established dimensions is poor form, and will make your cards less desirable when swapping.
- When choosing stamps and collage materials, remember to scale everything down a little. The small size of an ATC

lends itself to smaller designs that might get lost in larger collages or altered books. Save your littlest items for your ATCs!

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN A PRACTICING ARTIST?

I began my career as a practicing artist in 2005 while I was a student at Eckerd College. A graduation requirement for visual arts majors is to develop a body of work to exhibit at the Arts Center in St. Petersburg. The exhibit was a wonderful experience and opened the doors to many other opportunities. Since then I have participated in six shows, including one associated with "Faces of Courage" to benefit breast cancer research that will be touring Florida for the next year.

WHAT IS YOUR PREFERRED MEDIUM OF EXPRESSION?

I love storytelling through images. I use my scanner as my camera and my computer as my canvas to combine photographs, handwritten text, and other ephemera to create storytelling collages. I prefer to tell biographical stories. I have done one series about my maternal family's ties to the Caribbean island of St. Martin, and another series of storytelling collages about breast cancer survivors.

WHAT IS THE FIRST ART EXPERI-ENCE YOU REMEMBER?

Drawing! I can not imagine how many hours I must have spent drawing as a young girl, and I think my mother still has most of

what I drew! My parents offered me many opportunities to express myself creatively and they were very encouraging of my artistic endeavors.

HOW HAS ART EDUCATION CHANGED SINCE YOU WERE A STUDENT? HOW IS IT THE SAME?

The art classroom has always been the place where one is only limited by his or her imagination. Unfortunately, I think as time goes by there is more pressure on art educators to incorporate other subject areas into their curriculum. There is not as much teaching art for art's sake.

WHO WAS MOST INFLUENTIAL ON YOUR CAREER AS AN ARTIST AND YOUR CAREER AS AN ART EDUCATOR? WHY?

As an artist I am strongly influenced by the work of Jerry Uelsmann. I consider him a photographic genius because he was creating in the darkroom forty years ago what one can create in the digital darkroom today. His images are surreal, playing with opacity and layering — a technique I employ to create a haunting character to some of my work as well.

As an art educator I am influenced by my professors at the University of Florida, Dr. Craig Roland and Dr. Michelle Tillander. Coming into art education with a background in studio art, I wanted to learn how to be a better teacher. They have opened my eyes to different curriculum models and educational theories and challenged me to take my art curriculum to a new level.

AS AN ART EDUCATOR, HOW DO YOU MAKE TIME TO CREATE YOUR OWN ART?

My situation is complicated by the fact that in addition to being a full time teacher, I am a full time graduate student in art education at the University of Florida. I also have a husband and four very active children ranging in age from eight to thirteen!

Finding time for me is a challenge in and of itself, and finding time to create art at this stage of my career is especially difficult. However, inspiration can strike at any time, so I always keep a journal and sketchbook handy to record ideas to explore when the opportunity presents itself. The children have to sleep sometime!

DO YOU HAVE ANY SUCCESSFUL TECHNIQUES OR SUGGESTIONS FOR MARKETING YOUR ARTWORK FOR GALLERY SHOWS, EXHIBITIONS, SALES, ETC.?

Network, network, network! Most of my exhibition opportunities have come about through contacts I have in the art departments at Eckerd College and the University of Florida. If you hear of a call to artists, do not be afraid to enter your work. It just may be chosen for the exhibit! I also recommend the book "Art Marketing 101" by Constance Smith. I found it

to be an invaluable reference tool while preparing for my exhibits.

HOW DO YOU ENCOURAGE YOUR STUDENTS TO C ONTINUE THEIR PURSUIT OF THE ARTS IN SCHOOL AND BEYOND?

I have a unique situation in that I work at an environmental science charter school, which is very small - about 70 students and five teachers. Therefore, I do not have the facilities to teach all artistic media in the way that I would like. Since our students spend one semester at our school and one semester at their base high school each year, I encourage my students to learn the basics in my classes and take specialized classes such as photography, ceramics, or printmaking at their base high schools in the county.

SUMMERTIME—AND THE LEARNING IS EASY TOO!

ART is work and work produces ART, a result of coordinated mind-to-hand operations. Art educators understand the gamut of the creative process whether unexpected or rehearsed and messaged for a specific use. Many creators simply enjoy the process where making the journey is often more inspirational and satisfying than the end product.

How are students motivated to appreciate and enjoy this art-making process? What do art educators continually need to require of students for them to meet the unknown pursuit? Or is it a matter of questioning and re-questioning students of the visual arts at every level?

Is there a new mindset alerting art educators of change? Change inspires growth and the ability to overcome difficulties through critical thinking processes. Similarly, how can students be directed to accept any challenge instead of relying on a quick less thoughtful solution for a grade or sale? It has been said that Art mirrors life and isn't life full of the daily challenge?

What aspects of the visual arts present challenges for art educators responsible for teaching students?

- How to draw, to paint, to sculpt, to photograph, to create by bits and bytes...art educators know and do.
- How to research and learn, to study and review, to lecture and demonstrate, to practice and share, to question and ana-

- lyze, to decode, to problem solve...art educators employ such methods during instruction.
- How to narrate, to explore and simplify, to shock or enlighten, to abstract, to amuse, to express, to illustrate, to transform, to modify, to create...become absorbed into meaning for each art endeavor.

Teaching is not simply knowing what students should know, but also how they learn and when they have learned. At what time during a lesson and how are students most engaged in learning? By doing. There is no substitute for the experiential learning where students participate in the concept to be learned.

The same applies for art educators. And there is no better place to learn new trends, practice new skills or put heads together with other art instructors and find solutions to old problems than at a conference designed for art educators. The importance of life-long learning and sharing has long been recognized, and for art educators, the next opportunity is at the FAEA Conference in Orlando, October 18-21. Art educators will find sessions of updates, skills and practical information to apply to the artplace.

One of this year's keynote speakers, Dr. Larry R. Thompson, President of Ringling College of Art and Design, is a friend of Pink and Thompson's and believes in the connection between art and economy. He will validate what art educators have always known about the visual arts. Now, make a point of attending the 2007 FAEA Conference. Bring a passion for creating and learning and share ideas! Find out where the visual arts are headed. Take away new thoughts about communicating visually. And ... Enjoy.

tend to. Here are a couple of ideas that may help make your first weeks a bit easier

ADVOCACY NOTES

TEN NO-BRAINER STEPS TO BECOMING A DAILY ARTS ADVOCATE

FROM A BUNCH OF ARTS WORKERS JUST SITTING AROUND BRAINSTORMING

- Go to www.faea.org and click on Legislative Information and type in your zip code. Get the names and addresses of your representatives and put them on your mailing list.
- Make sure they get your flyers, postcards and requests for annual donor support.
- When you learn about an issue or a piece of legislative action, put it in your programs, your newsletter, on your website and/or on handouts in your lobby.
- Tell your board of directors, your favorite donors, and your artists what you think about any issue you become aware of. (This is conversation, not lobbying.)
- Add as a final item to every meeting agenda, "Does anyone know anything that's going on in the legislature/city council/ school board that we should be aware of?"

- Steal or adapt information from other organizations' materials if they are a few steps ahead of you on the information ladder.
- Coordinate advocacy with other groups. Build a coalition of arts advocates. (This one speaks for itself.)
- If you can't make it to local political events or hearings, get a report about what happened.
- If you make a curtain pitch or other live pitch for donations, mention any action you might be taking and let your audience know how they can take action. If you want them to make phone calls or write letters, have the numbers available.
- Provide sample letters or emails or talking points for people you are asking to do something specific.
- Remember that every conversation about your work is an opportunity to change the way your work is perceived. Be passionate, be informed, and be unapologetic.
















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
