## CHANGING MINDSETS

Video Games. The mention of them conjures up all kinds of negative thoughts for me. First of all, I could never get the hang of video games. Even when playing with my son over 20 years ago, he could master the game; I could not. Did I mention he was six years old? To sooth the wounded beast inside me, I convinced myself that video games were bad, a waste of time, mindaltering and overall no good to anyone. Me thinks I could have been a bit hasty.

At the NAEA Convention in Baltimore, I attended the second General Session. Its topic: "Video Games and Social Change". I thought, "Oh great! Just what I want to sit through." By the end of the session, I was thinking, "Oh great! Just what I needed to hear." Alan Gershenfeld, Chairman of Games for Change and a panel of gaming experts both in the business world and at the university level, provided the audience with information that, as the convention catalog stated, delved into the "power of video games [and their ability] to educate, engage, and empower 21st Century students to apply their artistic skills in order to bring about meaningful social change".

By the time the General Session was over, I was convinced that this tool of technology hit square on the head what we believe education and art education should be about. Indulge me here. I can easily replace the word "art" with "video games" in the following sentence: Video games and the development of video games allow students to think creatively, problem-solve, interact and be engaged in something they find rel-

evant AND motivates them to learn. Think about this. In your class, you give your students the ability to develop a game. This game has to be relevant to either something in the present or historical. Students must plan, work in groups, research, utilize creative writing skills, develop plot, provide a beginning, middle and end, develop a story board, utilize drawing skills, technology, and the list goes on.

In addition to developing games, playing these games enhances one's ability to understand and develop skills that are complex and fit into the new global workforce. Students involve themselves in role play and decision making that allow them to fail in a safe environment but also provides them with a balance of challenges and rewards. Video games and the development of video games are powerful tools in educating students! Wow! Would I have ever thought those words would come out of my mouth?

We are in "summer mode", but this is a time for us to begin looking at what we will teach in the fall and how we will teach it. I suggest we look at video games or at least, the development process. Perhaps you can involve students in the lesson plan process. In this day and time, we must look at new ways of thinking...of re-thinking. We need to move away from thinking that video games are a waste of time and re-think how we can begin to incorporate something that obviously engages students and is relevant to their every day lives. Yes, a new mindset for me. How about you?

I just wanted to share a few things with you. First, I was able to attend the NAEA Conference in beautiful Baltimore this April with four of my dear friends. That's the only way to travel. Get an art buddy and paint the town! The conference was great with many free workshops available. I will share some information with you about what I learned a little later. We had informative speakers and an up-close-and-personal concert by Peter Yarrow of Peter, Paul and Mary fame. He was charming, talented and very supportive of the arts.

Baltimore should be called "the city of friendly people." Everyone went out of their way to say or do something kind. From the harbor to the museums, the city was clean and picturesque. The Baltimore Museum had a featured show of works by Cezanne and the works of those he influenced. Besides an amazing collection of art inside, the museum also had a garden in full bloom outside with quality modern sculptures throughout.

We asked the locals where to eat (a very wise technique) and discovered a wonderful Italian restaurant in little Italy. We also found Vicaro's, known for their delicious, overstuffed cannolis. Our ultimate find was a restaurant called Moes. A local told us to go there for crab cakes. We were astounded to see softball sized crab cakes come out on our dinner plates. ## HIGH SCHOOL DIVISION

In the last edition of Fresh Paint I introduced the idea of sharing thoughts, strategies and knowledge to advance the high school visual arts curriculum through a spotlight section called 'essential questions'. I was very happy to see a strong response to our first batch of questions and look forward to a more robust involvement for our next article. Last edition's questions were:

#### **HOW DO YOU ENCOURAGE** STUDENTS TO VISIT LOCAL ART MUSEUMS AND GALLERIES?

Reponses: "Plan field trips once or twice a year", "Use specialized handouts when going to art exhibitions that engages students while they view art", "Invite local artists to speak with the students in the studio classroom", and "Begin each quarter with a required gallery visit".

#### WHAT MOTIVATES YOUR ART STUDENTS INTELLECTUALLY?

Responses: "For some kids—nothing works", "Need to teach critical thinking skills at the beginning of each new unit", "Challenge students to find some mystery to investigate in art", "Raise several questions for the students to answer that will stimulate a passion for learning", "Create 'image pages' for them to cut up and paste into their sketchbooks and then ask them to research each image/artist and write about what they learned".

#### **HOW DO YOU CREATE LESSONS** AND EXPERIENCES FOR YOUR **STUDENTS TO PROMOTE AESTHETIC AND CREATIVE** RESPONSES TO VIEWING AND MAKING ART?

Responses: "Always teach the language of art, the elements and principles", "Critically analyze art with the students", "Use Feldman's methodology for analyzing: Self-Critique, Peer Critique, Compare and Contrast".

This was a very informative way to help us become a stronger division. The sharing of knowledge helps us all become exceptional instructors and advances art education to new levels of creative achievement. Now that we are working on a new format for the next few editions of Fresh Paint, I would like to propose that we begin sharing handouts, lesson plans and student art works with links. I will be sending you FRESHPAINT \* SUMMER 2010

the next essential questions soon and will ask that you provide examples to share in either PDF format or .jpgs. Essential questions will always center on communicating philosophical perspectives, artistic strategies and the basic sharing of ideas. Thank you all for participating in this new professional sharing strategy. I look forward to reading and sharing the results of the 'essential questions'.


As I sign off from the 'Mile High City', I encourage all of you to have an enriched, exciting and rewarding summer full of professional development that

We are working with an extraordinarily knowledgeable and passionate team of individuals who are determined to set the bar high for art students in Florida. It is interesting to note that all framing/

writing/meeting has been done and is being done electronically! These standards will go to the Department of Education for adoption in October 2010. We hope to be able to unveil the new standards at the FAEA Conference in October.

Once you are finally able to dive into summer and the activities that make your heart happy, enjoy every minute! I hope you will find some time to travel, enjoy the company of family and good friends, do positive things for the community, and of course, create art!

A former student of mine who works at MICA furnished a private tour of Baltimore and shared insights into her life as an artist/activist/mother/wife.



# FAEA ANNOUNCES 2010 CONFERENCE KEYNOTE SPEAKERS DR. RONALD YRABEDRA AND JACQUELINE ROCH



## DR. RONALD YRABEDRA

Successful in academic and artistic disciplines alike, Dr. Ronald Yrabedra has been a fixture of the Tallahassee arts community for thirty years. In his tenure as a Tallahassee artist and educator, Yrabedra has served as the director of the Lemoyne Art Founda-



tion, faculty member for the Florida Institute for Art Education – funded primarily by J. Paul Getty Foundation, curator of a photographic show by 19<sup>th</sup> century photographer Alvan Harper and recipient of three grants by the Florida Department of State Division of Cultural Affairs. For his work at LeMoyne, he was nominated by the Tallahassee Democrat newspaper as Volunteer of the Year.

The work of Ron Yrabedra is in the corporate collections of numerous companies and in many private

collections, including that of U.S. Senator, Bob Graham, AT&T, Florida A & M University and Barnett Bank. In 1990, he was the featured artist in the twenty-eighth Major Florida Artists Exhibition at the Foster Harmon Galleries of American Art in Sarasota, FL.

Raised on Miami Beach, Roch attended Miami-Dade County Public Schools and was one of the first talent magnet program graduates. As a child she was formally trained in traditional oil painting by local Miami Beach artist Angela Sanchez. After graduating from Beach High, she went on to study at Parsons in New York and received her Bachelor of Fine Arts at the University of Miami in Coral Gables. Roch then moved to Manhattan to pursue a career in graphic design. In 1990, she returned home to continue studying and earned her Masters and Specialist degree in Art Education at FIU.

Roch's pastels can best be described as intense. Color and contrast play an integral part in her work. Her subject matter reflects the unique environment of South Florida. Roch's early training in traditional oil painting has directly influenced her use of pastels. Unlike other artists, her pastels are more painting than drawing. Roch's works have won a myriad of awards for her larger than life approach to this classic medium.




