

Below is a quick summary of information for the 2010 FAEA Conference to be held October 14-16 at the Florida Hotel and Conference Center at the Florida Mall, 1500 Sand Lake Road, Orlando, FL.

The conference will begin on Thursday, October 14 at 1:00 pm. There will be a general session on Friday, October 15 followed by a welcome reception and viewing of the K-12 Visual Art Digital Exhibition. On Saturday, October 16, the conference will conclude with a general session followed by a reception for the Member Digital Art Exhibition.

Please visit the web site at www.faea. org for easy registration at the best conference prices. Online registration begins August 1st. Don't forget, you must renew your membership before registering for the conference. The 2010-2011 membership year runs from July 1 – June 30.

Please note that in order to alleviate some of the overcrowding at some of the hands-on sessions we now have a small fee of \$5.00 for mini studio workshops and ask that you pre-register for them. But we have also reduced the registration fees. 2010 Conference fees are:

- Conference Registration for Members: \$115 (pre-online) \$130 (pre-paper) \$145 (onsite)
- Conference Registration for Undergrads: \$30 (pre-online) \$45 (pre-paper) \$60 (onsite)

Conference registration includes admission to all

general sessions, art forum sessions, receptions and the commercial exhibit hall.

You will need to register and pay a fee to attend the following workshops:

- All Day Studio Workshop (6 hours): \$30 (pre-online) \$45 (pre-paper) \$60 (onsite)

2) WHAT ARE THE BEST LESSONS/ ASSIGNMENTS YOU GIVE AT THE BEGINNING OF THE SCHOOL YEAR?

"Make Bad Art"

3) HOW DO YOU INVOLVE THE STUDENTS IN COMMUNITY ARTS EVENTS?

The NAHS does a lot of face painting at local festivals and events.

I really enjoyed the "Make Bad Art" responses and started thinking about how to approach that project. Who determines what is bad? And why? These are great questions to propose to our adolescent learners and keeps them engaged in aesthetics, critical thinking and global trends in art education. Thanks Connie for helping out! I always enjoy reading your responses. Another great response came from Debi Barrett-Hayes. Her responses were:

1) WHAT PROFESSIONAL DEVEL-OPMENT ACTIVITIES HAVE YOU PLANNED FOR THE SUMMER?

I am writing a big grant for our new Pre AP middle school class. Rewriting the syllabus for classes. Working on a K-12 Neo Retro Jungle exhibition for the school gallery that will be in blacklight and presented at FAEA and hopefully NAEA. Getting corporate sponsors for the workshops. Working on my Blackboard website for school. I will be taking a small group of students and a parent to Costa Rica for 9 days. We will do tourist things and we will make art in our sketchbooks. I will teach a gifted and talented art class in the summer for interested parents K-5. I will also work with Juvenile Justice for teens that have been involved with the Justice System.

2) WHAT ARE THE BEST LESSONS/ ASSIGNMENTS YOU GIVE AT THE BEGINNING OF THE SCHOOL YEAR?

I like to show off last years work in the first few days. I can show AP portfolio powerpoints students make for me after AP is done and I can go onto our Artsonia web museum and show artworks. I like to begin with non-objective works to loosen and free the students up from fear. We also use a stick to elongate our drawing utensil away from our bodies for looser control and we use our opposite hand. Blind contour drawing in black garbage bags is a good ice-breaker, as well as designing a personal logo for portfolios, notebooks and sketchbooks.

3) HOW DO YOU INVOLVE THE STUDENTS IN COMMUNITY ARTS EVENTS?

I have a long list of community service art projects and the students must participate in one each 9 weeks. Some of them include but are not limited to: The Memory Project (Creating portraits for orphans http://memoryproject.org); The Empty Bowl Project for Second Harvest Food Bank; Artopia for Big Bend CARE (helping patients with AIDS); The

Fur Ball (creating dog and cat works for auction to benefit the animal shelter); Take a SEAT for Art! artist created chairs for auction to benefit an art scholarship; Holiday Bazaar and Craft Fair to benefit the Art Department; and art works for the pediatric ward at the hospital.

Thanks Debi for some great inspirational responses. I really enjoyed learning about your service learning projects. The visual arts certainly shine in the state of Florida and I am proud to represent the high school division. Please join me at the conference to applaud our division and session presenters as they pave the way for new realities and potentialities in the visual arts. Sharing ideas, projects, research, partnerships and recognizing our members for their stellar accomplishments are what make the FAEA annual conference so rewarding. If you have never joined us, or if it has been a few years since you attended, please consider making

It is characteristic of pots found associated with a burial. We are burying last year and opening the door for new beginnings. The Tibetan Sand Painting is a mandala or cosmogram, the floor plan of a sacred mansion. We are charting our next mission through a reawakening of our subconscious. The Skeleton Tractor is a reminder that we plow our way through muck at times and have many spirits that join us in the planting for a new generation of thought and creativity. Last, but not least, is Sandy Skoglund's, Fox Games. Here she combines a full range of disciplines: theater to set the stage and cast of characters, sculpture to define the space, paint to create color and photography to fuse the elements together. Art educators bring the visual arts to life through combining various elements and imagery to create a fantastic visual art reality.

The upcoming fall FAEA Conference has the ability to be a spark for change in the lives of the attendees in much the same way as when we were in school ourselves. Don't forget to attend the meetings scheduled for each Division. This gives each Division time to meet in one location and discuss issues pertinent to that group. Come with suggestions for your division director regarding:

Keynote speakers for future conferences

- Locations for future conferences
- Workshops or subjects for presentations
- Issues affecting your school or museum
- Positive or negative feedback about the conference

SUGGESTIONS TO IMPROVE THE CONFERENCE


our class size reached thirty. That may be a small class next year. My

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ANSWERS TO YOUR CONFERENCE QUESTIONS



DO I HAVE TO BE A MEMBER OF FAEA TO ATTEND THE FAEA CONFERENCE?

Yes, you have to be a current member of FAEA to attend the conference. The membership year runs from July 1-June 30.

DO I HAVE TO REGISTER TO ATTEND THE FAEA CONFERENCE?

Yes, you must register to attend the FAEA Conference. You can pre-register online or fax or mail your paper registration. You can also register on-site. Pre-registration begins on August 1st and ends September 17th (postmarked) for paper registration and September 20th (at 11:59 pm) for online registration.

WHAT IS THE REGISTRATION FEE TO ATTEND THE FAEA CONFERENCE?

Online pre-registration is \$115, paper pre-registration by fax or mail is \$130, and on-site registration is \$145. Fees are reduced for undergraduate members and there is no fee for retired FAEA members.

ARE THERE ANY ADDITIONAL FEES TO ATTEND WORKSHOPS OR SPECIAL EVENTS AT THE CONFERENCE?

Yes, there is an additional fee and pre-registration required to attend any All Day Studio, Half Day Studio and Mini Studio Workshops which are considered "paid" workshops.

THEN WHAT WORKSHOPS AND EVENTS ARE INCLUDED IN MY REGISTRATION FEE?

All Art Forum sessions are included in your registration fee and are considered free workshops. All general sessions, receptions and access to the commercial exhibit hall are also included in your registration fee.

DO I SIGN UP IN ADVANCE TO ATTEND THE FREE WORKSHOPS?

No, the free workshops are on a first come, first serve basis.

IS THE CONFERENCE SCHEDULE IN FAEA'S FALL FRESH PAINT THE FINAL SCHEDULE?

No, the conference schedule in the fall *Fresh Paint* is still subject to change. Conference schedule updates will be posted online at www.faea.org. The conference schedule you receive when you check-in at the conference is your "final" schedule.

IS THERE A CERTAIN HOTEL I SHOULD STAY AT IF I AM ATTENDING THE FAEA CONFERENCE?

You can reserve a room at the conference site, The Florida Hotel and Conference Center, for the FAEA Conference rate of \$145/night. There are also other hotels in the area.

IF I HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT THE FAEA CONFERENCE OR MY MEMBERSHIP WHO SHOULD I CALL?



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THE SECOND WEEK IN SEPTEMBER DESIGNATED "ARTS IN EDUCATION WEEK"

The U.S. House of Representatives passed H.Con.Res. 275, legislation designating the second week of September as "Arts in Education Week." Authored and introduced by California Representative Jackie Speier (D-CA), this resolution is the first Congressional expression of support celebrating all the disciplines comprising arts education. This is a very positive showing of support for arts education and comes at a key time when Congress is making plans to overhaul federal education policy.

The resolution seeks to support the attributes of arts education that are recognized as instrumental to developing a well-rounded education such as creativity, imagination and cross-cultural understanding. It also highlights the critical link between those skills and preparing our children for gaining a competitive edge in the global economy. This is an important message for policy makers to acknowledge as they prepare to reauthorize federal education policy. As a House resolution, the bill does not require signature by the President upon its passage.


