LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Listed below are two different legislative updates. The first one is an update on legislation passed. The second is the status of the bills that were distributed in March.

SB 228: Code of Conduct sponsored by Siplin requires the district school board to include in the code of student conduct adopted by the board an explanation of the responsibilities of each student with regard to appropriate dress and respect for self and others. Requires a student be banned from participating in extracurricular activities for five days on second offense of the rules and up to thirty days on third offense.

<u>Implications</u>: Students in violation will be banned from participating in extracurricular activities.

SB 736: Education Personnel by Budget and Education Pre-K-12 sponsored by Wise with co-sponsors Gaetz and Hays Titled the "Student Success Act" revises provisions relating to the evaluation of instructional personnel and school administrators. Requires the DOE to approve each school district's instructional personnel and school administrator evaluation systems. Requires school districts to administer assessments for each course offered in the district.

<u>Implications</u>: A ssessment of student learning in fine arts courses will need to be developed and implemented. E valuation of fine arts teachers will be revised in the district.

HB 1255: Education Accountability by Education Committee and K-20 Competitiveness Subcommittee sponsored by Adkins. This "Catch-all Bill" revises numerous provisions relating to K-12 education systems and virtual instruction courses. In addition, allows for a student in grades 6-8 and 9-12 that score a level 1 or 2 in r eading that have had a level 3 or above for the previous 3 years to be exempt from the requirement of intensive reading if they have an academic improvement plan in p lace. This bill also added middle school career academies. <u>Implications</u>: Students who in the past were required to take intensive reading may be exempt. An insurgence of middle school career courses may arise.

HB 1329: John M. McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program sponsored by Bileca expands the scholarship vouchers to approximately 50,000 additional students without IEPS who qualify for accommodations under 504.

<u>Implications</u>: Allows for more students to leave the public school setting.

SB 2120: Class size: Language in the PreK-12 budget conforming bill redefines the term "core curricula courses" for the purpose of designating classes subject to the maximum class size requirements. The bill also provides flexibility for school districts to implement class size requirements when additional students enroll in a school after the October survey.

Implications: Allows more flexibility for classes not identified as "core".

HB 7197: Digital Learning by K-20 Innovation sponsored by Stargel mandates that every student take at least one online course prior to graduation and that statewide assessments be administered online by the 2014-2015 school year.

<u>Implications</u>: The bill allows a massive expansion of the use of online education.

LEGISLATIVE SESSION UPDATE FROM MARCH

There are a couple of bills that were being tracked closely. This is an update of the information distributed earlier through our legislative alert.

SB1320: Physical Education in P ublic Schools sponsored by Wise, co-sponsored by Sobel and Storms: This bill provides a waiver for middle school students' requirement for physical education under specified circumstances. It had the first hearing by the PreK-12 Education committee in th e senate on April 5.

ACTION: Died in Budget, Monday, May 9, 2011

HB349: Physical Education in P ublic Schools sponsored by Kiar: This bill deletes the parent requested waiver for physical education. While troubling at first glance, since this bill is n ot moving and was last addressed on March 8th, we are not too concerned. Of course, we will continue to monitor it closely. There is no need for action on your part at this time. In addition, we have met with Representative Kiar on this particular bill.

ACTION: Died in K-20 Competitiveness Subcommittee, Saturday, May 7, 2011

HB 289: Sponsored by McBurney **SB 988:** Sponsored by Detert

Public School Student Participation in Fine Arts Courses. This bill is a critical bill for fine arts as it provides for the participation of fine arts courses to be calculated in the school grade for elementary, middle and high school. We are in strong favor of this bill and continue to work with the bill sponsors to move it forward. Currently the last movement was March 8.

ACTION: Did not move to committee

HB1249: Career Education Sponsored by Nelson: This bill revises career and education planning course for middle grades promotion. Currently in K-20 Innovation Subcommittee last movement for the bill was March 14. We are closely monitoring this bill.

ACTION: Did not move to Committee

SB1830: High School Career Diploma sponsored by Wise: This bill requires a student and a student's parent to agree in writing to the requirements for a career diploma track. Specifies the 24 credits needed for this diploma. This bill lessens the require-



SUPERVISION/ADMINISTRATION DIVISION

As we come to the end of another school year and reflect upon all that has been accomplished, we have a great sense of pride and accomplishment as art education leaders. It's been a busy and productive year. And we have our work cut out for us in the next school year!

As you know, the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards, Arts were adopted by the Florida Department of Education on December 17, 2010. C ourse Descriptions are being revised to meet the needs of our arts students and districts are preparing to deliver professional development. Our colleagues at the Florida Department of Education are developing an imp lementation plan to roll out professional development as well. Art Supervisors can open the school year with exciting conversations about the big ideas, enduring understandings and benchmarks that define our art curriculum. Teaching and learning in the arts has some new language and a new look! If you would like to access NGSSS, Arts, they are available in word layouts at http://faae.org/curr_faae.cfm.

A team of administrators and teachers throughout the State are revising/developing Course Descriptions for Art Education Courses. Current courses are being studied and revised with consideration of demand, magnet and traditional school needs, needs of large and small districts, scheduling and school needs as we move into the future. Phase 1 of the course description process has gone to Department of Education leadership for review and adoption. Phase 2 course descriptions are slated for completion by the end of June 2011. Things are definitely moving along! S tay tuned for more information on the new and revised art courses.

The Request for Proposals for District developed Assessments for Hard-to-Measure Content Areas was released by the Florida Department of Education. Several districts expressed interest in applying for Race to the Top funds to create high quality interim and formative assessments in areas that are more difficult to objectively measure (such as art, world languages, and career and technical education). Items developed will be ready for field-testing by 2013-2014. The arts are stepping up and making a grand statement about the impact our courses have on student achievement!

As some districts are faced with financial challenges, it is more important than ever to remember that we are all lik e-minded professionals who care deeply about quality arts education. These are difficult times and we all need to be surrounded by colleagues and friends who share our passion for arts education. We know the work we do is important – students remind us of that every day through their creativity, innovation and self-expression! Every art educator should become familiar with the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards, Arts (NGSSS, Arts) and the depth of learning through the new standards. S hare that information with the administrator and colleagues. It's important to communicate how connections between the arts and other disciplines strengthen learning and the ability to transfer knowledge to and from other fields. As accountability measures continue to become more prevalent, so will the evidence to support the work we do every day. Let's continue to share best practices with each other and lean upon each other as we sail through unchartered waters!

Have an arts filled summer, take some time to relax and refresh. We have the opportunity to open the new school year with a grand statement about the importance of arts education!

ment of fine arts credit for students seeking this diploma. Currently the last movement on this bill was March 14. We are closely monitoring this bill.

ACTION: Died in Education Pre K-12 Monday May 9, 2011

SB 1620: K-12 Educational Instruction sponsored by Flores: Adds statewide virtual providers to the list of public school choices. A uthorizes the creation of a virtual charter school with funding. In a ddition it provides that home education students may enroll in certain virtual education courses or courses offered in the school district in which they reside. This bill may have an impact on school enrollment that indirectly has an impact on school fine arts programs.

ACTION: Laid on Table refer to HB 7197

SB 228: Code of Conduct sponsored by Siplin: Requires the district school board to include in th e code of student conduct adopted by the board an explanation of the responsibilities of each student with regard to appropriate dress and respect for self and others. Requires a student be banned from participating in e xtracurricular activities for five days on second offense of the rules and up to thirty days on third offense.

ACTION: Ordered Enrolled

By now we would hope that you have your established network in place and you too are poised to move into action if necessary. H opefully, you have already been in contact with your legislators and/or their aides to ask them to be diligent in their bills to ensure that there are no unintended consequences that would impede the students' participation in fine arts course work.



FAEA Museum Division members Maria Brueggeman (<u>Boca Raton Museum of</u> <u>Art</u>), Linda Powers (<u>Frost Art Museum</u>) and Marshall Adams (<u>Vero Beach Museum</u> <u>of Art</u>) attended this n ational conference in May. The AAM annual meeting is among the largest events of its kind in the world. While this conference is for museum professionals of all disciplines, there are many

Simon</u> in Houston, TX following "Questioning Assumptions: Alternative Futures for Museums." sessions, events and activities pertinent to art museums and our practice as art educators. This year's theme was "<u>The Museum of</u> <u>Tomorrow</u>."

Maria noted that she enjoyed the networking opportunities and the chance to experience different points of view in the field. She mentioned that a program that educators from the Museum of Fine Arts Houston highlighted, using the process of looking at art to improve clinical diagnosis

and communication among medical practitioners, was similar to a p artnership her museum has with the University of Miami Medical School at Florida Atlantic University to further develop the observation skills of third year medical students.

Among the sessions Linda attended, <u>"Interpretation 101"</u> provided a wealth of resources on how to develop programs and presentations. Participants learned effective ways to actively engage visitors by employing multiples senses. During tours, participants learned it is imp ortant to know your audience



and figure out why you (your institution) exist, why people visit your museum, and bridge the two to build interaction between objects and people.

While most museums agree that the activities to develop these skills are inherent in their work, they are not always intentional. Art museums can offer many opportunities for learners to engage in rich multidisciplinary topics outside of the traditional classroom environment, and lead the shift from the sole focus on content mastery to the wider goals of the 4 C's.

We all know that it hasn't been a great year for art education or education in general in F lorida and it looks like it's going to be even worse next year due to budget cuts. A lot of friends and colleagues are losing their jobs and this will most certainly be to the detriment of our public school students' ability to compete for college admission and scholarships. And as always, those students with talents and abilities outside of the mainstream academic areas are the ones who are going to be tossed by the wayside.

Being selfish, as a college-level instructor, historically my best students are those who have been taught by Florida art teachers. I'm very disappointed that the students who will now be enrolling in m y classes are not going to be as well prepared as in the past.
