Now is the time to advocate for your art program! Have a plan and try to follow it as much as time permits. We are all familiar with Eisner's "10 Lessons the Arts Teach" (https://arteducators-prod.s3.amazonaws.com/documents/1/6e45f2c7-43ec-468d-a75f-7a082a5a44a6.pdf?1450825980%29). If you're not familiar or need a little review, click on the link and use them to advocate. We know that the arts teach things that some of the core subjects do not. Art teaches us to think critically and judge in the absence of rules. Art teaches us to see things and interpret the world instead of just looking at the things in front of us. Art teaches us to use good judgement and experience things we would not experience in other classes. Art teaches us to say what cannot be said.

September 21, 2016 is World Peace Day. Let's all start planning to show the world that there is still a lot of love and peace. Pinwheels for Peace (www.pinwheelsforpeace.com) is a great place to start, but it should not end there. Tt's that time of year again! The semester is looming ahead Las I suddenly realize there is not enough time to do all the things I had planned to do over the summer. I came to this realization about a week ago, in the passenger seat of a minivan filled to the brim with dogs and luggage. As soon as we got moving, I dug through my bag until I found the book I planned to read in the car, The Slow Professor: Challenging the Culture of Speed in the Academy, by Maggie Berg and Barbara K. Seeber. For those of you not familiar, the book uses the philosophy put forth by the Slow Food Movement to argue that academics are being asked to do too much, too fast, by too many people. In fact, the book points out that in 2013 being a professor was ranked as the number one, least stressful job out there! Can you believe that? Because I can't! In fact, every year when I get my new assignment of responsibilities I am reminded of the absurdity of this ranking. I really look forward to seeing you in Naples.



Voted

This is an election year for not only the President of the United States, but United States and Florida legislators. It is critical that our voice be heard at the polls. We can make a difference by voting for legislators, school board members etc. that support education in general and visual arts education specifically.

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) was passed in December, 2015. Currently each state is working on their implementation plans. We need to be vigilant and focus on these plans and the implementation in each school district. The intent by the U.S. Congress for the implementation of ESSA includes the following:

- Clear Intent to support our nation's schools through a well-rounded education
- Requirements for well-rounded education that allows for use of federal funds.
- Flexibility of Title I funds to support a well-rounded education.
- More professional development for arts educators
- Flexible accountability systems that will be determined by the states
- Protection form "Pull Outs": The new ESSA discourages removing students from the classroom, including music and arts, for remedial instruction.

#### Florida Legislature

After the November elections, the Senate will meet on November 22, 2016 to organize committees etc. for the 2017 legislative session. This is where we will discover who the key legislators are on the education committees. The executive committees of Florida Art Education Association, Florida Music Education Association, and the Florida School Music Association will meet to discuss the platform to move forward legislation for arts education. This year's Legislative Session will begin on March 7, 2017 and end on May 5, 2017.



# 5 Classroom Management Tips for New Teachers

he first time I walked into her classroom I was stopped in my tracks. I tried to enter quietly, not wanting to disturb the flow of the class. This place was magical, filled with love and respect. Art supplies filled every corner of the room, students were bustling around the place with purpose and joy, and art was being made everywhere I looked. There was a palpable joy and compassion emanating from her. As I stood and watched her teaching I began to feel sad that I had left the K-12 classroom. The smell of paper, paint and pastels filled my nostrils, reminding me of the life I left behind. I quickly settled into a

corner, in front of a computer. Quietly moving the keyboard and mouse, I took out my pad to take notes. Today I will share some of those notes with you. In the short essay that follows I hope to offer 5 classroom management tips for new teachers. While I am no longer a classroom teacher, I still spend a lot of my time in art classrooms observing pre-service art teachers from Florida State University's Art Education Program — so these pieces of advice are a combination of my experiences teaching and observing in art classrooms.

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# 5 Classroom Management Tips for New Teachers

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#### 1. Start out like you can hold out

A wise woman once told me this on my first day as a high school teacher and it is still a piece of advice I use every semester at FSU. Sit down right now and write down the 10 things that drive you crazy and the 10 things that you appreciate the most from people. Now, use those to figure out what potential behaviors you will and won't accept in your classroom. Then, on the first day be clear about those behaviors, not in a stern, my way or the highway kind of way, but in a caring and compassionate way. Try to help your students understand that there are certain behaviors that will hinder the entire class' progress. And once you establish those behaviors, hold yourself and your students accountable (that means that if they can't chew gum, neither can you)! Some of the best teachers I have ever observed were the ones that knew what they could and couldn't put up with. Having the foresight to know your limits, make them transparent, and follow through, might be one of the toughest tasks a teacher faces. If you know having 35 high school juniors eating and drinking during class is going to drive you crazy, tell them that! If you are confident that chaos will ensue if 25 fifth graders don't know where to put their artwork at the end of the day, tell them that! Don't wait for students to make the mistake, especially if they didn't

even know it was a mistake in the first place. Remember, if you don't tell them, they won't know.

#### 2. Plan engaging lessons

In observing student teachers I have found that this is the biggest indicator of a successful class. When interns email me a half-hearted, barely completed outline of a lesson titled "how to draw a face", I can predict with 100% accuracy the success of the class (hint: its bad). Usually, if the student doesn't plan a lesson I would want to do, the day bombs — or at least the students are bored to tears. As you are putting your lesson and unit plans together, take a step back and ask yourself "would I want to do this?" Then ask yourself "will students take away an important and interesting piece of information?" Then finally, "will students learn something that will benefit them outside of art class?" If you answer ANY of these questions with a no, then go back to the drawing board! Student's can smell busy work from a mile away ...instead of having them read a chapter on pattern and texture, why not have them go out into the school and do texture rubbings? Then turn those rubbings into patterns, then use those patterns to create a piece of artwork that illuminates some sort of new understanding about themselves or the world!



#### 3. Praise your students whenever you can

This seems like a no-brainer, until you are in about the 10th week of school and you have exhausted all your "good jobs" and "I like the way you used (insert element/principle here)". Take some time to come up with some praise prompts, and I don't mean good job, well done, keep up the good work! Take a minute to think of the things you like to hear from your boss, partner, children, friends, and colleagues. What are the kinds of praise that put some spring in your step? Make a list of LOTS of these, so when you are having one of those days where you feel like you are all out of compliments, you have a place to go to find more. It is important to tell our students all the wonderful things they are doing, even if it is just that they made a great line leader or you appreciate that they put their brush bristles up by the sink. These little reminders of awesomeness are needed in an educational system that is based in deficit thinking. Test scores and grades (unless you are BRILLIANT) only serve to remind students that they aren't good enough. So take some time to make sure you can point out something wonderful about every student!

4. Ask for help

I know you all know if you have trouble to ask for help...but knowing and doing are two completely different things! As a first, second, or even third year teacher there are still lots of things you don't know and asking for help can feel a bit awkward. I remember this vividly about my first few years teaching. In fact, for the first few weeks of the semester I used the student's bathroom because I was too embarrassed to ask where the faculty bathroom was. There are all sorts of things you don't know as a new teacher - how does your duty schedule work, how do you schedule a sub, who do you ask permission to go to conference (hint, hint), what is the best way to get kids to clean up at the end of class, where do you turn in paperwork, and even, what paperwork are you supposed to be doing. You have too much to deal with in your first years to sweat little things like this. Most of the successful teachers I observe have a fully established support system in their schools. Remember, this network does not have to be the other arts teachers — you can find support in the spanish, english, math, or social studies teacher. Commit this year to finding one new friend each semester, even if it is just someone to have lunch with or to walk to the parking lot with after a long day!

#### 5. Love your students

This is my last little piece of advice and it may seem like an obvious one, but it is also one that is easy to forget. Your job is hard! You have to plan to engage and entertain hundreds of children every day — this is no small task! Often amidst the

paperwork, bus duty, lesson plans, parent teacher conferences, IEP's, IEE's, ITP's, and all the other alphabet soups of the educational world, we forget what is at the center of everything we are doing — LOVE. Every teacher I have ever observed that has really, truly loved their students has figured everything else out. Loving your students will help you hear them when they are hurting, celebrate them when they are soaring, catch them when they are falling, and support them as they are learning. When I walk into a classroom like the one I described earlier, the love is palpable. The teacher looks at the students like they are hers and the students look at the teacher like she is theirs. This shared love is what makes our jobs so wonderful and love should be at the center of all you do! So spend some time really listening and looking during your first few weeks of school, fall in love with your students and let them fall in love with you! I wish you all a wonderful year and look forward to seeing you at conference in October!

Both Dr. Hal Sutton and Dr. Julia Schwartz *(pictured bottom right)*, Florida State University, provided guidance to the group who renamed themselves the Florida Art Teachers Association (FATA). Dot Rowlett, Duval County's first art supervisor, was elected chair.

#### 1950 - 1951

Flora Walters, Florida Education Association (FEA) Art Section Chair

Florida Teachers of Art (FTA) began collecting annual membership dues of \$1.00. The theme of the Florida Teachers of Art section meeting at the Florida Education Association Conference

in Tampa was Art Needs of the Grade Schools.

In 1951, Dr. Hal Sutton of Florida State University became involved with the Florida Teachers of Art and

was the first program chair. The 1951 FEA art- section theme was The Importance of Art in the Development of the Whole Child.



#### 1953

Dot Rowlett, first-elected Chair of the Florida Art Teachers Association

The first Florida Art Teachers Association Conference was held in Orlando with the conference theme **How We As Art Educators Cooperate with General Educators and Meet The Basic Needs of Children**. The organization also forged new ground when it merged with the African-American art teachers' group.

Tropical storm Hazel disrupted the first conference but a determined membership carried on.

The 1954 Florida Art
Teachers Association

University art education

The conference consisted of meetings, speakers, and panel discussions. There were very few demonstration workshops, and hands-on activities were not included.

#### Dr. Dale Summers, University of Florida, FATA Chair

The now annual Florida Art Teachers Association Conference, **The Unique Value of Art**, was held at Ellinor Village in

Ormond Beach (pictured upper left), the largest family resort in Florida in the 1940s and 1950s. The conference still offered speakers and discussion groups but for the first time featured hands-on workshops and technical demonstrations. (Enameling workshop pictured immediate left) All speakers presentations were followed with discussion groups, and a recorder documented the proceedings.

Dr. Ivan Johnson, Department Chair of Art Education and Constructive Design at Florida State University, was elected NAEA president. Under his leadership, NAEA introduced student chapters. Students from FSU, the very first student chapter, attended the state conference. Among the chapter members were Dr. Laura Chapman and Dr. Clem Pennington.

Quarterly Florida publications continued, and the Florida Art Teachers Association had \$950.00 in the bank.

#### Jean Johnson, first Dade County Art Supervisor, FATA Chair

During this term, Augusta Poer headed a committee that drafted a new constitution and bylaws for the Florida Art Teachers Association.


The Board of Directors approved the changes.

Commercial exhibitions premiered at the conference. The exhibition area was known informally as "the SHIP." Founded in 1923, the SHIP is a professional and social organization composed of firms serving the educational field with individual corporate representatives acting on behalf of their respective organizations. Bill Milliken *(pictured bottom right)*, a representative for Binney and Smith, served as "captain" of the SHIP for many years. An avid photographer, Mr. Milliken's photographs document many of the early art educator meetings and conferences.

Dr. Ivan Johnson, Florida State University, was elected vice president of NAEA (*pictured bottom right*).

#### Marion Davis, Alachua County, FATA Chair

Helen Donnell from Miami was appointed to head a committee to write and create an elementary art guide. Florida now had 274 public-school art teachers and 22 private-school art teachers throughout 29 counties. Additionally, 7 counties had art supervisors and there were 70 university art/art education professors.

A 1957 Florida Art Teachers Association Conference was not held. Instead, a one-and-a-half-day planning session titled "Assessing the Present and Exploring the Future of Art Education in Florida" was convened in preparation for the upcoming Southeastern Art Education Association Conference, a regional event of the NAEA.

When the FATA elections slate was being developed for 1958, it was decided to make changes to the leadership structure and the Board of Directors. The title of chair was changed to *president*. For continuity, the leadership positions were designated as president-elect, president, and past-president, each to serve a two-year term.

#### Dr. Perry Kelly, University of Florida, FATA President

The 1958 Florida Art Teacher Association Conference, The Art in Art Education, was held in Miami. Annual membership dues were raised to \$2.00. Keynote speaker, Dr. Howard Conant, chairman of the New York University Art Education department, addressed "What Are Our Responsibilities?"

Ten new art teachers were hired in Dade in 1958, bringing the county's total to 80. Their annual starting salary was \$2,800.

Four universities were training art teachers across Florida. The art departments were headed by Dr. Ivan Johnson at Florida State University, Dr. Dale Summers at the University of Florida, Sister Mary Joseph at Barry College, and Dr. Mildred Landis at the University of Miami.

For the first time, members were recognized for their service, leadership, dedication, and assistance to the development of the organization. Honored were Charles Benbow, Margaret Yearwood, Marylou Kuhn, Louise Lingo Lewis, Henrietta Kuhn, Memphis Wood, and Florence Campbell.

The Southeastern Art Education Association Conference was held in Tampa. The theme was **Operational Creativity-The Nature and Future of Art Education in the Southeast**. There was an innovative visual presentation which made use of three slide projectors. National Art Education Association president Ed Zeigfeld spoke on "Learning to Look."

The 1959 Florida Art Teacher Association Conference was held at the Mayflower Hotel in Jacksonville.

A single room was \$5.00; a double room was \$7.00; and a twin room was \$9.00. Each room was air-conditioned and came complete with a television and radio. The hotel offered the use of the famous Mayflower yacht to the first 50 people registered. The conference banquet featured roast Rock Cornish hen and cost \$2.50.

## JOURNAL FODDER JUNKIES

David Modler (top left) and Eric Scott (bottom left) take journaling to a whole new level with Journal Fodder Junkies. For over 10 years these artists/educators have worked together creating visual journals. Their first book, *The Journal Junkies Workshop*, was released in 2010 and quickly became a bestseller in the mixed media community. In July of 2012, the duo released their follow up book, *Journal Fodder 365*. Their blog states that "as a dynamic duo [they] have presented workshops, presentations, and seminars on the visual journals spreading the importance, the power, and the joy of the visual journal." FAEA is excited to have Journal Fodder Junkies presenting as one of our keynote speakers at this year's annual conference, 1...2...3D: Art in Real Dimensions.





## **EVELYN ROSENBERG**



For 25 years, Evelyn Rosenberg had been a painter and printmaker. In 1985, however, Rosenberg developed a technique that used explosives to make metal sculpture. A process she calls Detonography, allow her to make monumental sculptures on a large scale. These site-specific pieces showcase intricate details in the sculpture. Rosenberg says, "The final result has a unique look. Looking at it you wouldn't know it was exploded because the effect is very controlled. I like the idea of taking a destructive force and using it to make something that I think is beautiful." Inspired by the many themes that are reflected in her work, such as philosophical ideas about the natural world, represent her interests in the way the sculpture is made. Sticking to FAEA's conference theme, Rosenberg says she uses fabricated metal in her work to create three-dimensional free-standing sculptures. 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


