Board Consultant's Report

Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

The United States Congress passed the Every Student Succeeds Act, and then it was signed into law on December 10, 2015 amending the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The state of Florida is currently completing the plan for submission to the U.S. Department of Education by September 18, 2018. The state plan was first submitted for initial public comment in June, 2016. The plan was revised and posted again for public comment from June 30 to July 31, 2017. FAEA on both occasions submitted comments focusing on the im-



portance that arts education be included as part of the plan for a well-rounded education.

The implementation of ESSA will be something that we will want to observe and act as necessary for arts education. The key here is that the arts are part of a well-rounded education that is so explicitly listed in the Act.

Florida Legislature

The Florida 2018 Legislative Session will begin on January 9, 2018 and will continue until March 9, 2018. The FAEA Advocacy Committee will continue to provide updates on bills that are proposed by Florida's legislators. Become a member of the FAEA advocacy effort. This statewide committee was formed to expand our efforts to let our voices be heard en masse. Members' thoughts and ideas are being sought to help us in advocating for arts education.

As HB 7069 has been passed and signed by the Governor, and is currently being reviewed for implementation by the Department of Education, we will keep you informed with updates.

The FAEA Advocacy Committee will work to keep you informed of bills that are filed and moving through the Florida House and Senate.

Remember to meet regularly with your Representatives and Senators to keep them informed on the importance of visual arts education for all of Florida's students.



With the beginning of the semester right around the corner, I've found myself thinking about how to best enter another year in higher education. For those of you who don't know, I've spent my summer in the last three months of my pregnancy. I have found pregnancy to be one of the most isolating experiences ever. These feelings are akin to the isolation I often feel in academia. Very few people understand how preoccupied you feel, the majority of the world is not going through the same expe-

rience, and despite your growing schedule (or belly), the world just keeps on spinning. As in the Parker Palmer quote, I find that in both my pregnancy and academic world my inner life remains situated inside, further deepening my feelings of isolation.



About two months ago I attended a birthing class and met my first pregnant friend. We have been texting each other and sharing in the joys and miseries that come in the final weeks of gestation. In her I have found camaraderie and kinship,

and slowly the cloud of loneliness I feel has begun to lift. Perhaps this is the secret to feeling more fulfilled and energized in our professional academic lives, as well.

Parker Palmer may just be on to something. We work in a world that rewards individual accomplishments. Our tenure is based on publications, service, and teaching. So with the exception of sitting on a committee with other colleagues, these requirements are all rooted in individualized expressions of success. Our articles are usually single authored, and if they aren't, the fight for being listed first is one we are all familiar with. Our teaching evaluations focus on our individual performance as instructors, and our service work is often realized in the small tasks we do before the monthly committee meetings are called to order.

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So this year as you enter August and begin to think about starting up a new year, think about how you might create an opportunity to engage in the vulnerable work of sharing not just your professional life, but also your inner life. Perhaps you get together with colleagues at someone's house for dinner before the semester starts off, or maybe you decide to invite the professor down the hall out for a drink. Whatever you decide to do, I encourage you to begin this semester by finding a way to open up and share your inner life with others. Maybe in doing so we will find deeper connections, kindred spirits, and if Palmer is right, we will all grow a little more as teachers.

50 Presentation Secrets of the Stars

While presenting to children and young adults may be second nature to teachers, presenting to peers may be a sure prescription for sleepless nights. Stellar presentations are all about the details. Here is a collection of practical presentation tips to keep in mind when planning, preparing, and addressing your next adult audience.

- 1. Plan with the end in mind.
- 2. Be prepared.
- 3. Be prepared.
- 4. Be prepared.
- 5. Dress sharp.
- 6. Wear comfortable shoes.
- 7. Show up as yourself.
- 8. Arrive early. Get a feel for the room. Set up. Then meet and greet.
- 9. Build rapport beforehand (chat, small talk).
- 10. Learn the lighting of the room and how to adjust.
- 11. Address any problems in the room (too hot, too cold).
- 12. START ON TIME. This demonstrates respect for the audience.
- 13. Use a powerful opening and closing.
- 14. Have an agenda. Visuals and props are interesting.
- 15. Have a "Plan B" if technology is involved.
- 16. Know your audience. Make sure that everyone can see/hear.
- 17. Set expectations early.
- 18. Provide a safe learning environment.

- 19. Tell stories.
- Manage the time well.
 Breathe. Enunciate. Speak slowly in a natural voice.
 Work the room; move around.
 Make learning *fun*.
- 24. No fluff, no digressions; stay relevant.
- 25. Don't make jokes unless you are really, really good.
- 26. Use multiple deliveries: roleplaying, demonstration, quiz, etc.
- 27. Never be afraid that you don't know an answer. Offer to find out.
- 28. Never do for the participants what they can do for themselves.
- 29. The brain can't absorb when the seat can't endure.
- 30. Use a pre-test to set a baseline.
- 31. Don't assume that people know something. Assume nothing.
- 32. Build in practices that can be applied immediately for great results.
- Keep energy high (smile, move around, maintain your enthusiasm).
- 34. Use an informal dialogue.
- 35. Avoid acronym soup, define terms, avoid jargon, and use full names.

- 36. Be patient with new learners.
- 37. Make the room your own.
- 38. Be flexible.
- Give very clear instructions when grouping.
- 40. Give very clear instructions when introducing tasks/activities.
- 41. KISS Keep It Simple, Sweetheart.
- 42. Use plain language.
- 43. Plant someone to ask the first question for the Question & Answer session.
- 44. Be consistent.
- 45. Show your human side; be authentic.
- 46. Don't apologize.
- 47. Stay on task.
- Hit important information 3 times in 3 different ways.
- Give everyone in the audience something (a handout, candy/ mint, pin, a small bottle of water, etc.).
- 50. END ON TIME. Leave them wanting more...

What is the Fine Arts Report?

The Fine Arts Report is a compilation of data about fine arts courses from every school district in Florida, which is published annually by the Commissioner of Education. It is a wonderful resource where you can see the progress your county has made in Arts Education. Comparisons can also be made to other districts throughout the state of Florida. Information provided in the report includes:

- data of student access and participation including breakdown in ethnicity, grade level, economic status, and gifted status
- information about the educators and their facilities
- details of the manner in which the curriculum is provided

How can I use the data?

The Fine Arts Report provides accurate, up-to-date information about your district in comparison with the rest of the Florida. Educators can use this information as a valuable resource to:

- present to your superintendent, administrators, parents, and local legislators
- provide accurate data for grants, scholarships, and other funding opportunities
- advocate effectively for your fine arts program

Why is it important?

The Fine Arts Report gives you tools to become familiar with what is going on in your district and how many students have access to Art Education, and in which disciplines. With the growing concern over budget cuts, administrative changes, and changes in state and federal leadership, <u>it is</u> <u>now more important than ever to advocate for Arts Education.</u>

Dr. Marion Jefferson, University of Miami, FAEA 80-81 FAEA President

The 1980 FAEA conference, "Elect Art", was held in Clearwater Beach in an election year.

On the first evening of the conference, the FAEA president hosted "The Incumbent's Constituency Party"— open to all members.

City of Clearwater **Mayor Charles F. LeCher** welcomed the participants at the first general session, and University of South Florida professor **Oscar Bailey** spoke on "Kites of the World." Keynote speaker **Pearl Greenberg**, of New Jersey's Kean College, addressed "A Fantasy for the Future, Some Realities of Today." Hillsborough County **Representative Helen Gordon Davis** and Pinellas County **Senator Don Chamberlain** were speakers at the "Rally Round Luncheon."

FAEA honored Nancy Douglas, Ivan Johnson, Fred Metzke, Hal Sutton, Dorothy Rowlett, Howard Sutton, and Anita Unruh with *Distinguished Service Awards*. Florida Governor Bob Graham presented Clem Pennington with the *Governor's Award for the Arts*. Commercial exhibitors provided a complimentary breakfast for participants on Saturday morning, and a sand-sculpture contest took place on the beach. The final evening conference event featured a cash bar — "The Liquor Lobby" — and a "Country Picnic," staged as a campaign event with hats, buttons, games, and fireworks.

Youth Arts Symposium participation rose from 128 to 340 students. FAEA began sponsorship of several regional

to 340 students. FAEA began sponsorship of several regional drive-in all-day workshops (mini-conferences) for art teachers. **Dorothy Kennedy** became the first chair of Youth Art

Month that was to be held annually during March.

In 1980, the Florida Legislature added visual arts and music to the basic skills list.

FAEA changed the name of the organization's newsletter to *Fresh Paint*.

Florida's 1980 Art Educator of the Year was Dr. Ivan Johnson, Tallahassee.

The 1981 FAEA conference, *Visions '81*, was held in Cypress Gardens. On the first evening of the conference, the president held a "Wine and Roses" reception for all of the participants.

The commercial exhibitors celebrated the opening of their area with a complimentary continental breakfast for conference registrants.



Keynote speaker **Dr. Edmund Burke Feldman**, president of NAEA, addressed "The Energies of Art." The culminating conference event was "The Grand Dinner Buffet."

One-day regional workshops were held in Tallahassee, Orlando, and Ft. Lauderdale. Fees ranging from \$25 to \$38 covered workshop material costs.

Headquartered in Miami, The National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts (NFAA) was founded in 1981 as a nonprofit arts organization. It was formed by a diverse group of individuals, corporations, foundations, and philanthropic organizations to support high-school students throughout the United States with cash, scholarships, and Presidential Scholars in the Arts Awards. [NFAA is now YoungArts.]

In 1981, the number of art teachers in Florida had increased to almost 2,800.

FAEA established a \$200 traveling fund for students wishing to attend the NAEA conference Florida's 1981 *Art Educator of the Year* was **Jacqueline Hinchey**, Miami.

After another period of expansion, there were now 3,500 art teachers in Florida. Over 400,000 students were enrolled in art classes and courses.

FAEA sponsored the 10th Annual Youth Art Symposium in cooperation with the Florida Department of Education and the Florida State University School of Visual Arts.



Richard Russey received NAEA's *State Association Newsletter Award* as editor of FAEA's *Fresh Paint* publication. He would receive the runner-up award the following year.



TEACHER FEATURE INTERVIEW with

Susan Convery

The FAEA 2017 K-12 Student Art Assessment and Virtual Exhibition concluded this past spring with over 1,200 artwork entries from students across Florida. This annual program is designed to serve as a statewide assessment for the visual arts, and to promote the achievements of students enrolled in visual art classes throughout Florida. Each entry is thoroughly evaluated and scored using a research-based rubric specific to the student's academic grade level. This year's "Best in Show" award was given to *I'm Fine...* by Sabrina Lin, who was taught by Susan Convery.

Susan Convery is currently a high school visual arts teacher at the American Heritage School in Plantation, Florida. Originally from the Northeast, this artist-turned-teacher has brought her life-long passion for drawing and painting into the class-



room. During the four years she taught at the American Heritage School, Convery has had seventeen of her students receive perfect scores on their artwork in the K-12 Exhibition, which were awarded the "Award of Excellence with Distinction." However, this year was the first time a student of hers received the top award of "Best in Show." The winning artwork, I'm Fine ..., was painted by eleventh grader Sabrina Lin, who excels as a student as much as she does as an artist.

The following article is a Q&A conversation with Convery about her teaching experience and her student, Sabrina Lin.

What led you to pursue a career in art education?

I originally tried to pursue a career in art as a painter and an illustrator after I had my kids, because I wanted to stay at home. I published two books – which I illustrated – but it is very hard

to make any money from books. My aunt, who is a teacher, said that as a mom, the best thing you could possibly do is work on your kids' schedule and become a teacher. So that's how I got into art education, because my passion has always been drawing and painting. I taught middle school, elementary school, a little bit of high school, and I discovered that my passion is at the higher levels. I really like taking someone who has the interest, but doesn't have the technical skills. Once they get in my program, I can keep the same kids from ninth grade to twelfth grade, which allows me to continue teaching them and help them reach a much higher level in their artistic skills and experience. When they say, "I had no idea I could do that," that's what makes me excited as a teacher. It's a great feeling!

Have you participated in the K-12 Exhibition prior to 2017?

I have done this every year I've been teaching at the American Heritage School, which is four years. I'm very proud of my students and their accomplishments.

How did the K-12 Exhibition impact the students that submitted artwork for the program?

It has been very rewarding for them to get the certificate and the recognition. And when I go to the conference and bring home their printed images that were on display, they find that to be exciting.

Did the students create work specifically for the K-12 Exhibition or was it part of your teaching plan?

By the time the submission deadline comes around, my students have now completed some decent artwork during the year, so they were able to pick their best work. At last year's FAEA conference, I took the course on how to be a juror. It was interesting to understand what the rubric is and what the jurors are using to look at the artwork. So that helps me teach the kids a little bit more about how to pick their artwork for the submission entries, since I know what the jurors will be looking for.

Can you tell us about your student, Sabrina Lin, and her process in creating her winning artwork?

She is one of my top students. Really just a lovely, lovely girl. She has a huge passion for art. She's one of those dynamic people that excels in everything she does: she's in National Honors Society, she will be the incoming president of the National Art Honor Society chapter, and she has won awards for a little children's book that she created last year in her spare time.

This winning artwork came from a project where students created three paintings on a single theme, and she chose "stress." Here is this phenomenally productive kid, and she wanted to portray what it feels to be stressed and how stressful it is to do everything that she does. She came up with idea of doing three pictures in a bathtub, and her being soaking wet and really showing what her internal self looks like. And while she was painting it, she carried it back and forth from home. Everywhere she went, people would stop her and talk to her about the painting, which allowed her to connect with people about what it feels to be stressed. I love how she titled it, *I'm Fine...*, because you look at her and you would think she has it all together, but we don't really ever know.

What are the major influences in her art-work?

What I see evident in Sabrina's work is that she seems to use her "self." She's very interested in using herself as a medium, much like Frida Kahlo did in her artwork. Frida used herself to connect to other people and always visually portrayed the stresses and problems in her life. I see Sabrina doing more of that.

Does Sabrina plan to continue pursuing arts after High School?

She does want to go to art school and she does have the support from her parents, who really admire what she does. It is exciting to think that she is just starting out, so we can expect a great amount of development in her style and process. This piece was really nice, and I think she is going to see it as a con-

nector piece to her later work. That always makes me so happy when I can see that and say, "Okay, you've got it now!" It's just like a kid on a bicycle. I can't wait to see what she does with her AP portfolio next year. She's planning to do her theme on the Chinese Zodiac and how it is integrated into her life.

Do you have any advice for teachers who have never entered work in the K-12 Exhibition?

It's really easy! And, it is really fun, especially for the kids because they get that recognition. I talk about competition all the time with my students, and I just think every chance you have to get your work looked at by jurors gives you feedback on what you're doing. If teachers take the time to look at the rubric, then it would be helpful for them because they would know what the jurors are looking for and help their students submit the right pieces.

TouchStones and the Affect of Social Practice

Allow me to introduce myself as a social practice art influence. Over the last year, I have been presenting the TouchStone (Livek, 2017) project in Missouri, and then, New York City. I was fortunate enough, through the School for Art Leaders, to be invited to present at the National Art Education Association convention in NYC. The project was made available through three offerings of opportunities to know and create Touch-Stones. This series of events was life changing.

Due to the TouchStone event's transformations in me, I am now saturated in ideas about social practice influencing and what that might mean. Incidentally, the TouchStone project came to fruition while I was completing research in policy enactments within the era of accountability. Living both worlds at once, as an art influence and a researcher, created connections that were too obvious to ignore. It is at this juncture that I realized my identity as a social practice influence, and as someone compelled to alleviate the stress of policy implementation on artist/teachers, could be combined to create new spaces to consider on behalf of the field of art education. As a social practice art influence, I work within conversations rather than upon a wall. As an educational influence, I work within the internal debates and revelations. These spaces for my artist-self and my educator-self are outside of the typical understanding of where art lives and where education lives. However, I find these spaces liberating.

Social Practice

I became a social practice art influence by accident. During a time of social unrest at the University of Missouri, I asked my students to work collaboratively to find something that we could do to help heal our community from the fear and uncertainty. Together we developed an idea that would help to provoke a welcoming smile or a simple hello. This idea transformed into the TouchStone. It is a simple process of making a tiny piece of art, paired with an extraordinary effort to reach out to someone. The central idea of the TouchStone is that it is something you can have in your pocket, and its very presence will help remind you that you always have with you something to give. And, when a moment presents itself, you are to give away the TouchStone. There are no constructions about what a "right" moment is; it is understood that you will just know. The TouchStones were left intentionally unmarked, unsigned,

and un-hashtagged. They were meant to be anonymous. This anonymity offers the persons giving and receiving the Touch-Stone to allow it to be just what it is. No marketing. No Facebook page. Just a genuine moment of giving without any social capital attached. What is produced by giving it away is the courage to give, as well as the courage to receive something that will call up in the recipient the courage to give it away again.

Policy Enactments and Interactions

Through this accidental transgression out of the gallery and into conversation and interaction, I have been able to continue working in the in-between

spaces. As stated earlier, as an educator I work with the internal debates and revelations. Specifically, as a practicing secondary artist/educator my biggest struggle was between my teaching style, the hearts and minds of my students, and the era of accountability. Sitting alone in the high school art studio, I would be struggling with the blinking cursor of the computer screen asking me for numerical, coded, and trended data. However, the poetic, metaphorical, and personally meaningful artwork that I am looking at moves far beyond data trends in the language with which they allowed me from the QWERTY keyboard.

Struggling to find a way to be a better artist/educator and doing all that I could to quit my addiction to "feign compliance so that I can do my job," I set out to read all that I could about accountability practices. Where did they come from? What are they supposed to do? Of what do I have control? Following a year or two of experimentation and investigation I developed an assessment mechanism that was far more qualitative than quantitative, and yet, still accepted by the administration. This discursive action generated what has become known as the "One Page Portfolio."

We Are In This Together

This generative experience cannot be singular. It happens continually. I started to develop new ways to free up space between the practice of being an artist/teacher and the assessment policies of the district in which I worked, and, it has been extraordinarily productive. However, I started to wonder more deeply about the ways that other artist/teachers work through, navigate, negotiate, transcend, or otherwise, artfully encounter and enact policy.

Now, my current quest is to ask questions about how other artist/educators make sense of the policies to which they are beholden even though the policies are written and implemented for other subject matter. Making art to make sense of policy is an extraordinarily creative act by which artist/educators utilize their artistic sentimentalities to create discreet, yet powerful, interpretations of what a day in the studio should look like to the students, the administration, and your professional learning community. I have been looking at the affective, aesthetic, and policy entrepreneurship productions that come from the uniquely (dare I say genius) way that artist/educators put policies to "*work*."

Please join me for an address on the *affects* of social practice and of policy-as-lived-practice embodiments on Thursday, October 21st at 4:00 PM. Let's continue the conversation about how living in an era of accountability has sparked unique and dynamic policy enactments in the field of Art Education!
